

Be it known and remembered that we the undersigned jury commissioners of the parish of Grant, duly appointed and qualified according to law, met this day in the clerk's office in the court house at Colfax, Grant parish, to draw a jury to serve at the next term of the District Court, to be held on the 4th Monday of September, 1890, it being the 22d day of September, A. D. 1890.  
The clerk of the court S. B.
