On Thursday evening, June 25th the campaign against the State lottery was formally opened with a mammoth meeting at the Grand Opera house in New Orleans, at which Dr. Palmer and other eloquent gentlemen spoke. The splendid arraignment of Dr. Palmer has about paralyzed the lottery cohorts, and the way they are twisting and squirming and frothing is funny in the extreme.

The Farmers' Vigilante of July 2d, has the name of Hon. T. S. Adams flying at its head as the choice of that paper for governor. A good man and true. Now let a stop be put to this third party nonsense, and let us see if the exercise of a little common sense and honest endeavor will not unite the people in solid Democratic phalanx. Any other course is but inviting sure defeat.

A Rousing Meeting.

Pursuant to the call and arrangements made by the Montgomery anti-lottery league for a picnic and barbecue at that place on the 29th of June, about a thousand persons assembled on the green and around the stand that had been especially prepared for the occasion. A bountiful supply of provisions and refreshments was one of the marked features of the day, the people of the town and locality being famous for their hospitality and preparations in this line.

The meeting was called to order by M. F. Machen and his objects explained. Permanent organization was effected by the election of H. M. Brian chairman and M. F. Machen secretary.

Prof. L. A. Traylor was then introduced and made a lengthy and excellent talk on the economic questions of the day. He spoke at length upon the necessity and many advantages of an education, and said that the farmers must educate themselves before they can even hope to better their condition.

Hon. Charles V. Porter of Natchitoches was introduced and made a rousing anti-lottery speech. He began at the earliest existence of lotteries, showing that they only existed and were tolerated in those times by and through the ignorance of the people.

The Farmers' Alliance, which by invitation aided in the meeting, predominated in its expressions. Resolutions were passed endorsing reform ideas as advocated by the alliance, and refusing to support any man not in accord therewith; the lottery proposition was unanimously denounced, and all honest and patriotic citizens called upon to assist in its defeat and abolishment.




