We hear that the Montgomery Mail is to be issued under a new management, presumably that of Messrs. B. A. Fortson and M. F. Machen, although no announcement is published of the fact. Mr. G. H. McKnight, after taking in the World's Fair at Chicago, has gone on a trip to Niagara, Quebec, Montreal, and other points, to visit his father's relatives. He writes us word from Fredrickton, New Brunswick, under date of Sept. 19th, that he expects to reach home Oct. 4th. At Fredrickton, on the 19th, he took in World's Fair No. 2, by the Provincial Government, a county affair of no great importance. He will visit St. John, and return home by way of Boston and New York.

District Court Items.

Judge Wear has given lawyers and litigants all the opportunity to "law" they wanted during the two weeks term of district court, by holding the court open from 8 to 12 hours every day. The consequence is that everything has been disposed of that was ready for trial. The grand jury came into court on Tuesday and reported that they had examined 117 cases, finding 41 true bills mostly for minor offenses. On public buildings they ask for proper rooms to be provided for grand and petit juries, and call the attention of the jailor for the necessity of cleanliness at the jail. They approve the action of the police jury in providing fire-proof safes for the protection of public records, and request them to have an especial eye over the charges from the court of Oney Smith, magistrate of ward one. They found no bill, but believe some of his acts to be illegal. All together the findings of the grand jury appear to have been thorough, intelligent and commendable.

Owing to Tobe Gains coming into court and pleading guilty to manslaughter, the jurors for the week were discharged from further attendance Friday morning, and the business of the court was then wound up in time to adjourn sine die at 12:30 o'clock.

Tobe Gains, for manslaughter, gets ten years in the penitentiary. Wm. Langford, convicted of attempted rape, goes to the penitentiary for 18 months.

Wm. Jackson, convicted of maliciously shooting a cow, was fined \$50 and costs, and in default of payment to four months in the parish jail.

Jim White, convicted of stealing a hog, was granted a new trial.

In the case of J. W. Pollock, resisting the payment of taxes, the plea of prescription was sustained in favor of the parish, and injunction set aside without damages. Appealed to supreme court.

J. P. Hadnot, curator ad lites, vs. R. L. Futrell et al, exception to jurisdiction maintained and non suit entered.

Several judgments were proved up, also a few other civil cases of minor importance were decided.

Solutions to Problems.

By Mr. J. P. Hadnot—Divide \$60 between three men so each will have his proportionate share, A to receive one-third, B one-fourth, and C one-fifth.

What will each man receive? Answer—A will receive \$25 25-47, B \$19 7-47, and C \$15 15-47. The solution is that the proportionate share of each is 47-60ths. Thus: A receives 20-47ths, B 15-47ths, and C 12-47ths.

By Mr. R. R. Jeter—If a hen and half lays an egg and a half in a day and a half, how many eggs will six hens lay in seven days?

Answer—At the rate proposed the six hens would lay 28 eggs in 7 days. Solution—The whole hen takes 1 1/2 days to lay 1 egg, and the half hen also takes 1 1/2 days to lay 1/2 egg, therefore the hens lay at the rate of 2/3 of an egg a day. At the rate of 2/3 of an egg a day 6 hens would lay 4 eggs a day, and in 7 days the 6 hens would lay 28 eggs.

Those who send in correct answers to both problems are: Miss Emma Etheridge, Emuel Etheridge, James Woodruff, Leon McCain, Geo. A. Payne, Chas. M. Ingram and Robt. McKnight. Miss Annie Hadnot and R. M. Moore manage the first aught, but one makes the hens lay too many eggs, while the other lets them lay too few. Mr. L. T. Etheridge works the egg problem, but fails to divide the money rightly.

Israel Smith and his brother A. F. Smith, colored teachers, send in correct solutions of the money problem, but both slip up on the eggs. Frank Wilkins, another colored teacher, correctly solves the egg business, and very curiously comes within a fraction of the money problem, but failed to get the answer.
