The Congressional Election.

In the primary election on the 7th inst., to nominate a Democratic candidate for Congress from the 4th district, 2369 votes were cast for Ogden, 1925 for Pierson, 1306 for Hall, and 609 for Boone—making a total of 6212 votes in all.

Hon. H. W. Ogden having received the majority over the other candidates, has been declared the Democratic nominee. He is well qualified for the position, and what is better, in the minds of most people, he is in line with the "free silver" sentiment of the district. On this score we are free to say that in common with thousands of other good Democrats he has gone astray and become a "silver bug," being influenced thereto under the mistaken Silver-King-Populist idea that Cleveland and all Democrats who support his policy are "gold bugs," committed to a contraction of the currency. We believe this to be all wrong, and that before the present Congress adjourns, the passage of the Meyers seigniorage bill, and other measures of great public benefit, will force Mr. Ogden and all other good Democrats to admit that this is really and truly a bi-metallic administration, and entitled to the earnest support and sympathy of the rank and file of the party in all of its measures.

Believing that the majority have the right to the support of the minority in all party measures, we shall vote for Mr. Ogden, and insist that it is the duty of all Democrats and good citizens interested in the progress and prosperity of the people to do the same.

Measures of national reform are only to be carried out by united party action, and in these days of Populist folly and communistic disorder, it is imperative for lovers of good government, law and order, to stand together. Come out to the polls next Tuesday and give "Gallant Harry" Ogden a rousing vote for Congress. We differ with him on some points, but he's good enough for us, for all that.

The Populists of the 4th Congressional district met in convention at Natchitoches on the 17th, and nominated C. D. Hicks, of Caddo, as their candidate for Congress. Nine parishes out of twelve were represented, and Judge Machen, of Grant, was elected chairman. Mr. Hicks made a speech, in which he said that he was a Democrat, and broadly intimated that he expected to get a majority of the Democratic vote in the district, which he puts at 11,000, because Mr. Ogden only got 2369 votes in the late primary! He entirely ignores the fact that 6212 votes were cast in the primary, which will not only virtually go solid for Ogden on the 24th, but will control and carry for him fully that many more votes. The best that Mr. Hicks can hope for is possibly 4000 Populist votes, and that will not be half enough to elect him. We do not believe that any considerable number of sorry Democrats can be found who will take stock in Mr. Hick's pretensions.

Speculation in School Lands.

Some valuable public school lands are to be sold in Grant parish on Saturday, May 26th. By referring to the advertisement of "Sixteenth Sections to be Sold," it will be seen that these lands are located in township 8 north, ranges 1 and 2 west. It is claimed by some that combinations have been made by speculators and mill men by which many acres of timber lands have been sacrificed at one-quarter of their value at sales heretofore perfected. Our grand jury called attention to this matter by protesting against it at our late term of court, but we call special attention to the fact that the officials are almost powerless to prevent this imposition unless the people of the interested townships take an active hand and assist in the matter. In the first place the elections to order sales should be opposed unless there are good reasons to believe that the lands will bring their full value, and after the lands are ordered to be sold the citizens of the locality should take enough interest to send in a delegation of three or four persons to see that the land is not valued too low.
