CHARTER

THE ENTERPRISE LUMBER COMPANY, LIMITED.

STATE OF LOUISIANA, Parish of Rapides.

Be it known, That that on this the Nineteenth day of January, A. D. Eighteen Hundred and Ninety-Five, before me Louis V. Mayo, a Notary Public in and for the Parish and State aforesaid, duly commissioned and sworn, and in the presence of the witnesses hereinafter named and undersigned, personally came and appeared H. E. Hardtner, herein representing the Corporation of Nugent, Hardtner & Co., Limited, W. L. Kidd, J. Q. Prestidge, Messrs. Crow & Co., T. C. Barron, residents of this State, who mutually and severally declared, that availing themselves of the provisions of Act No. 36, of the Legislature of this State, of the session of 1888, approved June 29th, 1888, as well as the general laws of this State, relative to the organization of Corporations, they have formed and organized, and by these presents do form themselves into and constitute a Corporation for themselves, their successors and such persons as may hereafter be associated with them, and their successors, for the objects and purposes and under the stipulations and conditions, hereinafter set forth and which they adopt as their Charter to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name and title of this corporation is declared to be THE ENTERPRISE LUMBER COMPANY, LIMITED, and under its corporate name shall have the power and authority, to have and enjoy succession for the period of Twenty Years, from the date hereof, unless sooner dissolved, it shall have the power to sue and be sued, in its corporate name, to make and use a corporate seal, to hold, receive and purchase real and personal property, to lease the same, to make contracts, to sell Mortgage and hypothecate the same, to name and appoint such managers and directors as its interests may require, and to make such by-laws and regulations for the proper management of its affairs as in the judgment of the board of directors may be necessary and proper.

ARTICLE II.

The domicile of said corporation shall be the town of Nugent, Grant Parish, Louisiana, and all citation and other legal process shall be served on the President, Vice-President or Secretary of said corporation.

ARTICLE III.

The objects and purposes of this corporation shall be that of conducting a general Merchandizing, Saw Milling and Planing Mill business, at Nugent, in Grant Parish, Louisiana.

ARTICLE IV.

The Capital Stock of this Corporation is fixed at One Thousand Shares of One Hundred Dollars each, and the said Stock shall be paid for either in cash or in property, to the value subscribed at the time of organization, said Capital Stock may be increased not to exceed Five Hundred Thousand Dollars, or may be reduced by a vote of the Stockholders, owning two-thirds of the Shares, at a meeting called specially for that purpose, by publication in one newspaper published in the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, for a period of thirty days prior to the said meeting; and said company shall commence business when \$15,000 shall have been subscribed.

ARTICLE V.

All the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in and exercised by a board of directors, composed of seven directors, of whom four shall form a quorum for the transaction of all business, the said directors to be elected annually on the 15th day of January of each and every year, and such election shall be held by ballot, of which election ten days prior notice shall be given by the Secretary to each stockholder, by notice sent to him by mail or otherwise, and directed to his domicile or place of business and each share of stock shall be entitled to one vote, to be cast by the person holding same or by written proxy.

The following parties shall constitute the first board of directors: J. Moore, Nugent, President; W. L. Kidd, Vice-President; E. J. Hardtner, Secretary and Treasurer; H. S. Crow, T. C. Barron, J. Q. Prestidge, and Henry E. Hardtner, directors; and who shall hold office for the term of one year or until their successors are elected.

At the annual meeting of each and every year, a statement shall be made of the condition of the business and a showing made of the assets and liabilities of the corporation. A failure to elect directors on the date above specified shall not dissolve this corporation, but the board of directors shall continue to hold office until a new

election is held, which shall be as soon as possible after due notice as aforesaid. Vacancies occurring in the board of directors shall be filled by the remaining directors. The said directors shall make all by-laws, rules and regulations, for the management of the corporation, and alter and amend the same at pleasure, make contracts and purchases, hire, employ and discharge all agents, employees and clerks, and fix all salaries, and generally do all things necessary for the conduct and management of the business and affairs of the corporation.

ARTICLE VI.

No shares of the stock of this corporation shall be transferred, unless they be first offered to the corporation and then only after giving six months previous notice to the other Share holders, and no stock holder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of this Corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due on the Shares of Stock owned by him.

ARTICLE VII.

Whenever this Corporation is dissolved, whether by limitation or other cause, its affairs shall be liquidated by Two Commissioners, to be appointed from the Stockholders for that purpose, after Thirty days notice by publication in a Newspaper published in Grant Parish, Louisiana, who shall remain in office until the affairs of the Corporation are liquidated, and in the event of the death of one, the other shall continue to hold office, and in the event of disagreement they shall call in an umpire whose decision shall be final.

ARTICLE VIII.

This Charter may be changed, modified or altered, or may be dissolved, at a special meeting of the stockholders convened and held for that purpose, after thirty days prior notice by publication as before mentioned, and with three-fourths of the capital stock of said corporation.

The following parties have subscribed these amounts: Nugent, Hardtner & Co., Limited, 70 shares; W. L. Kidd, 25 shares; J. Q. Prestidge, 20 shares; Messrs. Crow & Co., 20 shares; T. C. Barron, 20 shares.
