Another Jail Delivery.

On last Tuesday night B. F. Moore, white, and Butler Johnson, Geo. Milligan and Ed. Clifton, colored, escaped from the Colfax jail by digging through the brick wall at the front of the building, and making their way to the ground by means of the shed over the front door. T. O. Moore, who was confined on the charge of murder, refused to go. None of the fugitives have been caught yet.

This sort of business has become altogether too frequent in Grant parish, and in this case is the result of criminal neglect on the part of the jailor. There are two fine steel cages in the jail, from which escape is impossible, if ordinary precaution is observed. Yet five desperate men were allowed the freedom of the jail room, to escape from which it was only necessary to dig out eight or ten soft bricks.


