The treasurer also reports the number and amount of each warrant paid to something near one hundred different individuals, (teachers and others,) all of which is unnecessary and a confusing rigamarole, so far as the public is concerned. The general public has no interest in how much pay Mr. Willie Whackem or Miss Sallie Spankum get for their services, but the citizens of the different communities do have an interest in the amount of money in each district fund, and want to know how much they may expect to run their individual schools. The school board, Superintendent and treasurer are expected to see that all items are correctly kept on the books, but there is no need in the world to publish a complete transcript of the treasurers' books. Let Bro. Dunn quit his foolishness, and give us a concise, common sense statement of parish and school finances, such as the people of Grant parish have been accustomed to for ten or twelve years past.

JUDGMENT.
