PALACE FROM EUROPE.

Fred W. Vanderbilt Bringing Napoleon's Mansion to Set Up on the Hudson.

A royal palace of France brought across the ocean and set up on the banks of the Hudson is the newest surprise produced by a New York multimillionaire. That is the carefully conserved plan that Fred W. Vanderbilt is now carrying out. On his commanding site in Hyde Park on the Hudson he is going to set up the Malmaison palace of Napoleon.

In half a dozen shops of New York the almost priceless decorations of the old French palace are being regilded, burnished, and retouched and made ready to put together again. Up in the great stone pile overlooking the Hudson are now being placed in position the marble columns, the mosaics, the mural decorations that the armies of Napoleon once plundered Europe, Asia and Africa to get for their master.

WILL ENTER A CONVENT.

Ex-Salvation Army Brigadier, Miss Susie F. Swift, Decides to Take the Veil.

Miss Susie F. Swift, formerly a brigadier in the Salvation Army, whose conversion to the Roman Catholic faith a year and a half ago caused a commotion in the army, is about to enter a convent.

Miss Swift is the daughter of a lawyer in Poughkeepsie and a graduate from Vassar college. She taught English and higher mathematics in a girls' school at Morristown, N. J. On account of illness she went abroad.

In England she became interested in the work of the Salvation Army. She will enter the convent in August as a postulante for a novitiate of one year, at the end of which she will take the white veil. The black veil will be taken at the end of the second year. Then will follow a period of five years in the life of the convent, at the end of which perpetual vows are taken.

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
