Killed by Lightning.
 During the prevalence of a thunder storm on Wednesday of last week, 17th inst., two men were killed by lightning on the Big Creek tram, four miles west of Pollock, and a third was knocked insensible by the same bolt. The men were teamsters for J. W. Barron, and had taken refuge from the storm under a tree. The killed were Tom Jordan, aged about 25, and Ab Blackwell, aged about 30, both natives of Mississippi. Henry Boyett, a young man of about 18, a native of Grant parish, was some distance from the trunk of the tree down which the bolt descended, and escaped with his life, but was severely stunned.

The country in that region has had three or four deaths from lightning in the last year or so, and seems to be somewhat subject to lightning, doubtless caused by underlying mineral deposits in the bowels of the earth.
