The Time to Plant Turnips. Fall turnips can be planted any time from July 20th to September 30th, and there is no reason why people in this country should not always have plenty. Rutabagas and the globe varieties should not be planted later than September 1st, as they take longer to grow, but the flat Dutch and other quick growing varieties can be planted any time within the seventy days mentioned. The best average time to plant is between August 15th and September 15th, although we have seen nice small turnips made planted as late as the middle of October, but they usually fail to make anything when planted so late.

Intimidating Negro Labor.

A special to the Times-Democrat, dated Winfield, Aug. 6, says: The labor question, which has been giving the lumbermen at Pine Tree and Kelly mills trouble for some time, broke out anew last evening, when a mob of about fifty white men called on the employers and asked that they discharge all negro laborers.

When it was reported that some men were in the vicinity of the mills for the purpose of interfering with labor, the matter was reported to Sheriff Bailey, who went to the scene immediately and arrested and placed under peace bond the entire force of intimidators.

The majority of the people of the parish are in favor of the mills employing negro labor if necessary, and will protect them in it. The intimidators did not seek violence, and it is the prevalent opinion that they are only attempting to scare the negroes.
