## To Make Vitrified Brick.

Mr. Thos. J. Merrick, representing the Ross-Keller Brick Machine Co., of St. Louis, has been in Colfax for the past three or four days, for the purpose of selling a machine to make vitrified brick. A meeting of our citizens was held Thursday evening, and again Friday morning, to organize a company and take charge of the enterprise, which may be regarded as definitely instituted, as there is no doubt as to its success and profitability.

Mr. Merrick has four brick made by his company's machine from the clay dug at the depths of two, four, six and eight feet in Mr. Will LaCroix's brick yard in Colfax, and the brick are pronounced to be first-class, the clay being particularly suitable for the purpose.

The proposition is to organize a company with \$5,000 or \$10,000 capital, for the purpose of manufacturing vitrified brick, for which there is an unlimited demand.
