DIED. PRINCE.—At her home near Stay, Grant parish, La., at 6 o'clock in the evening, on Saturday, Jan. 6, 1906, Mrs. Emma Eliza Prince, born in Washington Co., North Carolina, February 21, 1825, departed this life aged 80 years, 10 months, and 15 days.

The deceased was married three times. First to August Ballio, August 21, 1843, by whom she had four children, only one of which is now living, Mr. W. W. Ballio, a well known citizen of this parish. Her second husband was James M. Rummell, whom she married April 28, 1859, and her third husband was Ira H. Prince, to whom she was married Nov. 5, 1872, by neither of the last marriages we believe she left any children. She was the sister of Alfred C. Lewis, deceased, one of the old time citizens of Grant parish. Mrs. Prince joined the Methodist Protestant church at Mt. Zion in 1875, and for many years lived near Montgomery, Grant parish, where she was noted for her piety and christian living. On the day of her death she had moved on her homestead, and was apparently well all day on an attack with heart failure in the evening, when she died in a few minutes, before her son and grandchildren who were in the house even thought she was seriously ill. She leaves one living son, eleven grandchildren and one great-grand-child. Her remains were laid to rest in the Bethel graveyard about noon on Monday, Jan. 8th, a number of relatives and friends being present to pay their last sad respects. All of her descendants were at her burial except Gustavus N. Ballio, who is serving in the U. S. Marine Corps, now in the Mediterranean Sea on the ship Minnesota. Weep not for the departed, but may we all meet her in that better land.

AN ORDINANCE To levy a general license upon all persons engaged in all professions, businesses, etc., which may be conducted within the corporate limits of Colfax, Louisiana, under the laws of Louisiana.

Be it enacted by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the town of Colfax, Grant parish, Louisiana, in regular session convened: Section 1. That a license tax equal in amount to the license tax imposed by the Police Jury of the Parish of Grant for parochial purposes, and as set forth in the list of such trades and professions and businesses as are named in the Act No. 171 of the Acts of Louisiana for the year 1905, and as amended, be levied on the same as are hereby levied on all such trades, businesses and professions as are named in the ordinances of the Police Jury of the Parish of Grant, and as set forth in said act, and such license shall be for the amount fixed in said act and acts amendatory thereof, provided that this ordinance shall not apply to any trade, calling, business or profession as is now prohibited by the laws of Louisiana or the ordinances of the Town of Colfax. That this ordinance shall go into effect for the year 1906 and for each year subsequent thereto, unless repealed.

Be it further enacted, etc.: Section 2. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this act be and the same are hereby repealed. Introduced by J. W.
