Proclamation of Election.
STATE OF LOUISIANA,
PARISH OF GRANT.

By virtue of the authority vested in us and in accordance and pursuant to the proclamation of his Excellency Newton C. Blanchard, Governor of the State of Louisiana, we do hereby order an election to be held in the parish of Grant and State of Louisiana, at the usual places for holding election in said parish of Grant, on the 21st day of April, 1908, the same date being the Tuesday following the third Monday in the month of April, 1908.

The election so ordered and to be held is for the purpose of electing the following officers, to-wit:

All the State officers of the State of Louisiana, one Senator for the 27th Senatorial district, all the Parish and Ward officers of the parish of Grant, and to vote for or against the adoption of the Constitutional Amendments to the Constitution as proposed by the Extra Session of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana as held during the year of 1907.

Said election to be in accordance with the general election laws of the State of Louisiana and due returns made thereof as the law directs.


