CHARTER —OF THE— CHRONICLE PRINTING CO., LTD.

STATE OF LOUISIANA.

PARRISH OF GRANT.
Personally came and appeared before the undersigned authority, the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, all of full age, who declared that availing themselves of the laws of the State of Louisiana relative to the formation of corporations, and especially of Act No. 78 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana for the year 1904 they have covenanted and agreed, and by these presents covenant, agree and bind themselves and all others who may hereafter become associated with them, to form and constitute a corporation and body politic in law, for the purposes and objects, and under the stipulations, limitations, articles and conditions hereinafter following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name and title of this corporation shall be "The Chronicle Printing Company, Limited," and its domicile is hereby fixed at Colfax, Grant parish, State of Louisiana, and under its corporate name it shall have the power to contract, sue and be sued, make and use a corporate seal, and alter the same at pleasure, to hold, receive, have, purchase, alienate, convey, sell, borrow, pledge, mortgage and hypothecate, under its corporate name, property, real, personal and mixed; to name and appoint such officers, directors and agents, managers and employees as its corporate business requires; to make and establish by-laws, rules and regulations for the conduct of the business of the corporation; and to alter the same at pleasure; and generally to do and perform all other acts and things permitted by law, or as may be necessary and proper to carry out the purposes and business of the corporation.

This corporation, unless sooner dissolved, shall exist for a period of ninety-nine years from date hereof. The president, or in his absence, the vice-president shall be the proper person upon whom citation or other legal process shall be served.

ARTICLE II.
The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the business which it shall carry on and conduct are hereby declared to be to own and operate, print and publish a newspaper in the town of Colfax, parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, and to carry on said purpose to buy, own, use and operate all type, machinery, fixtures and presses necessary for the said business; to own and operate job presses and do job work of all kinds, and generally to do a general printing, publishing and job work business.

And for the purpose of carrying out the objects and purposes above named, the said corporation is hereby empowered to own and operate and generally to exercise all the powers conferred by Article I of this charter as to all the property which it may purchase, lease, or use for the said business, and it is hereby empowered to own, use and operate all property, type, presses, engines, fixtures, labor saving devices generally used in first-class printing establishments, and to make all advertising and other contracts usually made in the newspaper business and all other contracts which the corporation, through its Board of Directors, may consider necessary and beneficial to the interests of this corporation, and generally to do and perform all acts, sign all documents, and make all contracts usual in the newspaper and printing and advertising businesses.

ARTICLE III.
The capital stock of this corporation shall be THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS, divided into and represented by Thirty Shares of One Hundred Dollars each, which stock shall be paid for in cash, property, services or otherwise as is provided by the Constitution of Louisiana and its laws.

Any stockholder may sell, assign, or transfer his stock in this corporation, provided thirty days notice be given of such intention to the company, and the other stockholders shall have the first privilege of purchasing the same. After the expiration of the thirty days, the stock may be sold in the open market.

No transfer of stock shall be binding upon the company unless made on the books of the company, and no transfer of any fractional share shall be made. This corporation shall commence business as soon as Three Thousand Dollars of the capital stock is subscribed for.

ARTICLE IV.
The corporate powers of this corporation shall be and are hereby vested in a Board of Directors to be composed of four stockholders, and until the next annual meeting of the stockholders the Board of Directors shall be composed of the following stockholders: Charles H. Teal, Mrs. Luella D. Goodwyn, James J. O'Quinn and Alfred M. Goodwyn, of whom Charles H. Teal shall be President; Mrs. Luella D. Goodwyn, Vice-President; Alfred M. Goodwyn, Secretary; and James J. O'Quinn, Treasurer. Said Board of Directors and said officers shall continue in office until the first Monday in January, A. D. 1910, on which day at 10 o'clock a. m., and annually thereafter, on the first Monday of January, at said hour, the stockholders shall assemble in the office of the corporation at Colfax, Louisiana, and elect from the stockholders a Board of Directors to be composed of four stockholders, and also a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer for the corporation. Any stockholder may be a member of the Board of Directors and hold any one of the said offices.

The Board of Directors and the officers named shall hold office until their successors are elected, and in the event, for any cause, the stockholders should fail to meet on the day herein fixed for the election of a Board of Directors and the officers, then the President of the corporation is hereby vested with the authority to call a meeting of stockholders any day after the day fixed for the

election of a Board of Directors and of officers, provided that fifteen days prior notice in writing is given to each stockholder of the place, day, month and hour of holding the said election. Each stockholder at the stockholders meeting shall be entitled to one vote for every share of stock he owns as appears by the books of the corporation. At such meetings the President of the corporation shall act as Chairman, and the Secretary as Secretary of the stockholder's meeting.

ARTICLE V.
The Board of Directors shall have full power to fill vacancies occurring in the Board of Directors by death, resignation or otherwise, as well as vacancies of offices, provided such vacancies are filled from among the stockholders of the corporation. The Board of Directors shall have full control of all the property and all the business of this corporation and shall so conduct, manage and use the same, as in their discretion shall seem fit and proper, and is consistent with the objects, purposes and welfare of the same. They shall also have full power to hire and discharge all employees and fix their salaries as well as the salaries of the officers of the corporation. Until the stockholders shall otherwise decree by a three-fourths vote of all the stock of this corporation, the President of this corporation shall control the policy of any newspaper published by this corporation, and it is especially agreed that no personalities shall be put in the columns of any such newspaper, the only criticisms allowable being criticisms of public officials in their public conduct, otherwise, such newspaper shall confine itself to publishing the news. It is especially understood and agreed that such newspaper shall be conducted in the interest of the farmers, of the commerce, and general upbuilding of the country, the Parish of Grant and its surrounding parishes.

It is hereby declared the object in publishing any newspaper shall be to give the people of Grant parish and surrounding parishes a clean and wholesome news medium, devoted to the moral and material welfare of all the people. The President of this company shall have the power to designate an official motto for such newspaper.

ARTICLE VI.
This charter may be changed, modified or amended, the capital stock increased, or this company dissolved, at a general meeting of the stockholders called for that purpose, with the assent of three-fourths of the capital stock present or represented at such meeting, the three-fourths here meant being three-fourths of entire capital stock of the company as shown on its books as subscribed for.

In case of a dissolution of this corporation for any cause, the liquidation of its affairs shall be conducted by three liquidators to be elected by the stockholders at a meeting called for that purpose, said liquidators to have full authority to dispose of the property of the corporation and wind up its affairs. They shall remain in office until their duties as such are completed and shall fill vacancies occurring in their number from among the stockholders.

ARTICLE VII.
No stockholder of this corporation shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults or negligence of this corporation, in any further sum than the unpaid balance due the company on the shares of stock subscribed for or owned by him, nor shall any informality in organization render this charter null or subject any stockholder to liability beyond the unpaid balance on the stock subscribed for or owned by him.
