### "Do Not Kill the Birds."

Prest. Frank Miller, of the State Game Commission, lectured in the Colfax court house last Tuesday night to an audience of nearly two hundred persons. His subject was illustrated with stereopticon views, and the burden of it was, "Do Not Kill the Birds." He made a strong talk for the protection of the birds, and made unqualified claim that their destruction was responsible for the boll weevil pest that now infests the country. His lecture should be heard by every citizen, and especially by the farmers and school children of the land. Mr. Miller was accompanied by State Game Warden Thompson, who operated the picture machine during the Professor's interesting lecture.

### Verdict of Manslaughter.

The trial of Fabian Bouvey, last week at Plaquemine, La., for the killing of Prof. Fred Van Ingen, who was shot down in the presence of his wife a few hours after his wedding, resulted in a verdict of manslaughter. This is plainly a compromise verdict, although the prisoner and his friends hoped for a mistrial or an acquittal. The defense rested on the "unwritten law," Bouvey claiming to have avenged an alleged wrong by Van Ingen to his former sweetheart. The jury in the case evidently repudiated the right of Bouvey to interfere after Van Ingen had made legal reparation, if any was due, which the friends of the victim and his wife claim to have been entirely preposterous.

### The King Brothers Acquitted.

Private information from Winnfield brings the news of the acquittal of Andrew and Van Shack King for the killing of Owen Ferguson, marshal of Athol, last Christmas. The case against Richard Cook for aiding and abetting the killing was abandoned by the State during the trial, and the jury ordered to return a verdict of acquittal for him. Self defense was urged, it being insisted that the arrest of Van Shack by the marshal was illegal and made in a cruel and inhuman manner, such as to justify Andrew in killing Ferguson to protect his brother.

Of Vital Importance to Farmers. The agricultural papers of the country, the Memphis Commercial Appeal, and other influential journals, are just now engaged in a campaign of earnest appeal to the farmers of the country to grow winter forage crops. The importance and seriousness of present conditions cannot be too strongly urged upon our planters, and all should act.

Sow any or all of the following crops, and you will not regret it: Turf oats, red oats, rye, vetch and alfalfa.

No section of our country can be truly prosperous that buys its food for man and beast, and this is particularly true at present, when the prices of all food products are high.

### The Miles-Mills Case.

The court having disposed of all cases ready for trial, adjourned this week from Tuesday to Thursday, the day set for the trial of Roy Miles and Hargis Mills, charged with rape. In addition to the regular panel of 30 jurors, 40 tales jurors were summoned in this case. Only ten jurors were secured out of this number up to 11:30 a. m. Friday, and the judge ordered the sheriff to summon ten additional talesmen.

The attorneys for the defense are W. C. and J. B. Roberts, E. G. Hunter, Amos L. Ponder, J. A. Williams and Joel M. Durham. District Attorney Jno. R. Hunter is being assisted by Attorney C. H. McCain in the prosecution. A great deal of interest is being taken in this case, and the court room is nearly filled during the progress of the trial.

When court adjourned for dinner yesterday (Friday) eleven jurors had been secured, as follows: J. T. Busby, S. B. Parish, Albert Brown, J. H. Stephens, I. R. Pool, W. P. Harrison, W. S. Drewett, E. W. Pollard, W. M. Bowen, A. M. Brown, A. E. Crump.

The entire list of 80 jurors was exhausted at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon without selecting the twelfth juror, and court adjourned until Saturday morning awaiting 10 extra talesmen.
