Among these causes there is no heredity, and it is a feature of inebriety, as it is a fact of all disease whatever, that heredity tends to prevent inebriety, and all other diseases. Accident, mutilation, disease poison, the destructive war, the self-imposed degradation of the race, are the agents of death; but heredity as the servant of that development of life and living forms, which waits upon use and disuse, is the active agent of the "survival of the fittest."

A study of this subject will verify the truth of these propositions.
