

**Lyceum Lectures.**  
 The first of the series of Lyceum lectures will take place in the court house at 8 p. m. October 5. Mr. Manship is an eloquent speaker and an entertainer of national reputation, and no one can afford to be absent on the evening of October 5. The Lyceum course is under the auspices of several of our leading citizens who are offering to the people of Colfax the benefits of a series of lectures which are refined, elevating, entertaining and educational. The subjects are well chosen and well adapted to the average mind, and will be greatly appreciated by all who avail themselves of the advantages which the institution offers.  
 Mr. Manship will be followed by other distinguished speakers, the dates of whose lectures will be announced in due time. The list of attractions so far embraces the following names, Herbert A. Sprague and Floy Mahan Sprague, who will appear in Rip Van Winkle; The Orphans; The Nell Litchfield Trio; and Karl Jansen, from "The Land of the Midnight Sun."

**Movement for River Transportation.**  
 On Sept. 27th eighteen or twenty Colfax citizens assembled on short notice at the court house to take action relative to getting the line of steamboats now running between New Orleans and Alexandria to extend their service to Colfax and further north if possible.  
 J. W. Duncan called the meeting to order, and requested H. G. Goodwyn to act as secretary.  
 Capt. T. M. Wells being requested to state the object of the meeting said that his understanding of the matter was that the steamboat line would require the guarantee of a certain tonnage of freight from the shippers of this section before they would consent to come into this territory. He suggested that as there were only a few of the business men of the town present it was best to refer the matter to the Colfax Board of Trade, so some action could be taken that would be considered by the steamboat company.  
 After further discussion of the subject by J. A. Hyde, M. E. Swafford, C. H. McCain and others, the matter was referred to the Board of Trade.  
 On motion the chair appointed Capt. T. M. Wells and Mr. J. Q. Long, secretary of the Board of Trade, as a committee to address the Progressive League of Alexandria and find out from them as to the rates and conditions the steamboats will give Colfax shippers.  
 The meeting then adjourned subject to call of J. W. Duncan, president of the Board of Trade.
