Official Proceedings of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Colfax.

Colfax, La., June 4, 1912.

The mayor and board of aldermen of the town of Colfax met this day in regular session with Mayor R. R. Jeter, presiding. Present: Aldermen W. A. Brownlee, F. B. Cole, J. Q. Long, G. H. McKnight and J. E. Swafford. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

On motion of W. A. Brownlee, seconded by G. H. McKnight, J. Q. Long was elected mayor pro tem.

On motion of W. A. Brownlee, seconded by J. Q. Long, G. H. McKnight was elected secretary and treasurer.

On motion of G. H. McKnight, seconded by J. E. Swafford, J. H. Brister was elected tax collector.

On motion of F. B. Cole, seconded by W. A. Brownlee, G. H. McKnight was elected street commissioner.

On motion of W. A. Brownlee, seconded by G. H. McKnight, the salaries of the several officers were fixed as follows:

Mayor	\$75.00 per annum
Sec'y. and Treas.	75.00 " "
Street Commissioner	50.00 " "
Marshal	45.00 per month

In addition to his salary the marshal shall receive five per cent on all licenses and taxes collected, provided that he shall not receive a commission on fines.

On motion of W. A. Brownlee, seconded by F. B. Cole, H. G. Goodwyn was elected town printer.

On motion of W. A. Brownlee, seconded by J. Q. Long, the following was adopted as the budget of expenses for the town of Colfax for the year 1912:

Resolved by the mayor and board of aldermen of the town of Colfax, La., That a tax of eight mills on the dollar be and the same is hereby levied on all taxable property within the corporate jurisdiction of the town of Colfax, La., for the year 1912.

Resolved, That this resolution be advertised according to law.

Mr. J. H. Brister, town marshal, offered his bond as Marshal, and on motion of W. A. Brownlee, the same was approved.
