Section 1—Be it ordained by the School Board of the parish of Grant, in lawful session convened, That an election shall be, and is hereby called to be held in the said School District of Verda, Louisiana, No. thirty-one (31), in the parish of Grant, on Monday, the 30th day of March, 1914, at which election the majority of the property taxpayers of the said district, in number and amount, eligible to vote and voting shall determine the

PROPOSITION to rescind, repeal, set aside and invalidate the 5 mill tax authorized by the vote of the property taxpayers of the School District No. 31 on the 17th day of June, 1913, and to relieve the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of Grant from levying the said tax for the years 1914 to 1922 inclusive, and in lieu therefor to incur debt and issue bonds of the School District No. 31 in the parish of Grant to the amount of Twenty-Two Thousand (\$22,000) Dollars, to run for the period of eight years, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable annually; the funds thus derived to be used for the

PURPOSE of erecting and equipping a high school building in the town of Verda, Louisiana.


