Mr. P. M. Fuqua, principal of the Bentley school, favors us this week with a 19-page communication, which he entitles, "A Suggested Plan for Making the Rural Schools Better, and for Solving Some of the Rural School Problems," but we find his contribution too long for publication. His ideas boiled down are about the same as those suggested by State Supt. Harris, to give two school sessions a year, with vacations at end of each, instead of the terms as at present arranged.

The junior Chronicle man and his family enjoyed a ride last Sunday afternoon on the Colfax-Rochelle model road with Mrs. Wm. LaCroix in her handsome 7-passenger "Hudson Six" automobile. The road was in fine condition, and some half dozen or more families were out in cars enjoying the early spring afternoon. Mrs. LaCroix is quite an expert at handling her car, and we noticed that she was also cautious on approach curves in the road to sound her horn as a signal to any one approaching from the opposite direction. We mention this fact for the reason that we noticed some cars did not sound a danger signal at the curves, which is required of all cars by a parish ordinance.

The brick building that is being put up by Messrs. T. H. and Moward McNeely, at the corner of "B" street and Railroad Avenue, has made good progress this week. About ten feet of the south wall is up, and five or six feet of the north and west walls up, and several of the door and window frames have been set in place. Mr. P. L. Clark is the contractor, and we understand that Mr. Jac Bloch and Dr. J. L. Woodall will occupy the building when finished.

Mr. T. C. Linecum, of Selma, was in Colfax on Thursday, presumably to retain counsel for his brother, G. G. Linecum, who has been arrested on the charge of being implicated in the assassination of Breckinridge Starks, who was killed near Selma on March 14. We learn that G. G. Linecum will be taken to Alexandria to-day (Saturday) by Sheriff Perkins, where he will be given a preliminary trial.

Rev. J. A. Parker requests us to announce the special Easter Services will be held at the Colfax M. E. church on Sunday, April 12. The Sunday school children are requested to prepare songs and recitations, and all will be invited to make an annual offering for the benefit of the Ruston orphanage.

A number of the lady friends of Miss Alda Tower gathered at the residence of Mrs. D. M. McKnight on Thursday afternoon, and proceeded to give her a "linen shower," in honor of her approaching nuptials, the date for which is reported to be near at hand.

Winn Parish Police Jurors in Trouble.  
Winnfield, March 19.—W. J. Bice, member of the Winn parish police jury, from ward five, who was recently indicted by the grand jury on a charge of trading and dealing in parish script, pleaded guilty yesterday, before Judge Moss and drew a fine of \$50 and costs. He made no attempt to fight the charge. It is charged that Bice was guilty of dual office holding, having held the position of deputy sheriff. It is needless to say that his position of police juror is vacant, under the provision of the law.

J. L. Brewton, who was also indicted by the grand jury, and who is a police jury member from ward ten, has recently made bond in the sum of \$4,200 and employed former Judge W. M. Wallace to defend him. He is charged with having misappropriated parish funds at different times. In one instance, it is charged, a bridge was to be built in his ward, the cost of which was to be \$65. The police jury made an appropriation to cover this and Brewton is said to have called on the parish treasurer, saying that he had been asked to bring the money out to the party, as the distance was considerable, and requested that the check be made to "bearer." It is charged that Brewton would also have the checks made in a sum twice or three times the amount appropriated and would draw the money, pay for the bridge, and no one know what became of the balance of the money drawn. It will be remembered that the grand jury recently criticized the treasurer and police jury for the looseness of the financial methods employed by the parish.

### Promulgation of Town Election.

Colfax, La., March 12, 1914.  
The Mayor and board of aldermen met this day pursuant to call, Mayor Long presiding. Present—Aldermen F. B. Cole, J. E. Swafford and W. C. Carnahan. Absent—Aldermen J. T. McMurry and G. H. McKnight. Secretary McKnight being absent, J. E. Swafford was appointed secretary pro tem.

The council met for the purpose of counting and promulgating the vote polled for mayor, marshal and five aldermen voted for in the town primary election on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, 1914, and after a canvass of the returns of the election declare the following as the result:

For mayor we find that J. Q. Long received 86 votes and had no opposition. For marshal we find that S. W. Johnston received 52 votes and J. M. Dufilnon received 47 votes. S. W. Johnston having received a majority of the votes cast is hereby declared to be the nominee for marshal.

For aldermen we find W. C. Carnahan received 86 votes, R. M. C. Duncan received 54 votes, H. B. Faraldo received 80 votes, S. L. Wells received 39 votes, A. M. Goodwyn received 64 votes, G. H. McKnight received 2 votes, J. T. McMurry received 74 votes, J. B. McKnight received 39 votes; and W. C. Carnahan, R. M. C. Duncan, H. B. Faraldo, A. M. Goodwyn and J. T. McMurry having received a majority of the votes cast are hereby declared to be the nominees.

There being no further business the council adjourned.
