Uncle George on Panama Tolls and Mexico.

Editor Colfax Chronicle:

I sometimes quit work and sit down and read the papers, and when I read of the opinions of great men and thus mingle with them I am impelled to express my ponderous opinion on various affairs. I am truly glad to find that Mr. Aswell and Mr. Thornton have correct views in regard to the Panama Canal tolls. I don't know what reasons they advance for their position, but they are right in wanting every body to pay their share of the toll, that is certain. I believe in Uncle Sam favoring his citizens, but don't pick out pets and favor them at the expense of the rest of us. Uncle Sam has spent a lot of money to build that canal. He has also spent a lot of money to establish the parcel post system and the general post office department. Now I think it would benefit a heap more people to permit the great department stores to send goods to customers all over the United States free than it would to let these wealthy ship owners pass through the Panama Canal free. They wanting to carry their goods through to sell for their own individual profit, not ours.

We are supposed to have helped pay for the canal and get our money back in tolls. If I use the canal it is right that I pay for the use of it, and if I send a letter or package by mail it is right that I pay for it. I like for us to keep faith in all our treaties, and I don't think we should permit our trans-continental railroad lines to send their ships through the canal free when they are not in the employ and sailing under orders of the U. S. government. In other words, no vessel should be allowed to pass through the canal free except U. S. government vessels on government business. I hope the other Senators have got a right view of this before now. I wrote a speel on this thing some time ago, but I am afraid Mr. Thornton didn't read my article to the Senate. If he had, they surely would have repealed that toll bill before.

There is another little matter that seems to be worrying Uncle Sam just now, I mean Huerta's salute. He seems to have decide to fire the guns if he has the right calibre and can find out how many to shoot. I suggest that Uncle Sam lend him some of those guns that burn \$500 or \$600 worth of powder at a shot, and lets have a salute worth contending for; and of course Uncle Sam will return the salute. 

#### S. Troops Occupy Vera Cruz.

Acting under orders of President Wilson the battleships of the United States proceeded to Vera Cruz, Mexico seaport city, in reprisal for insults to the American flag, and on Tuesday, April 21, landed a force of marines and took possession of the city. The troops of Gen. Maas, the Mexican commander, offered resistance, and a considerable fight ensued, resulting in the killing of six U. S. marines and the wounding of thirty. The Mexican loss is placed at about 200 killed and wounded. In all about 3000 U. S. soldiers were landed for occupation, in the face of three times that number of Mexican troops, but the Mexicans were no match for them, supported as they were by the big guns and splendid marksmanship of the American navy.

A great deal of excitement prevails, both in the United States and in Mexico, and the question as whether or not there will be further advances in Mexico rests almost solely upon the Mexican usurper Huerta recognizing American rights and apologizing for his indignities to the flag.

#### A Bomb Shell for the Police Jury.

On Tuesday we were surprised to hear that a decided sensation had been sprung by District Attorney Hunter, who had just learned that four of the seven members of the Grant parish police jury are disqualified under the law to act as police jurors. Act 94 of 1894 provides that a police juror must have \$250.00 worth of property assessed to him before he is qualified to serve as a member of the police jury.

By request of the district attorney Sheriff A. B. Perkins has furnished him with an affidavit showing the assessments of the members of the members of the police for the year 1912 and 1913, to be as follows:

We inquired of Mr. Hunter as to what action if any, he proposed to take in the matter, and he informed us that he would notify the parties who are unqualified to show cause why their office as police jurors should not be vacated under the law.

In the cases of Messrs. Richardson and Dunn (and possibly others) we understand that they have an inheritance and control of estate property largely in excess of the necessary \$250.00, but the question appears to be based on the requirement that that much property must be assessed to them.

#### The Tampico Oil Company.

The Tampico Oil Company is the title of a company organized at Winnfield, to bore for oil or gas.

The capital stock of this concern is fixed in the sum of \$200,000, consisting of 200,000 shares of \$1.00 each. The first board of directors are: Capt. C. H. Teal, of Colfax; Dr. T. A. Sims, B. S. Atkinson and F. W. Offenbauser, of Texarkana; B. W. Bailey, J. R. Heard, O. M. Grisham and G. P. Long, vice-president; O. M. Grisham secretary and J. R. Heard, treasurer.

#### Million and Half Raise in Assessments.

Mr. J. B. Roberts returned from Baton Rouge last Saturday, where he had been to attend as a member of the State Board of Appraisers. The assessment of the public service corporation of the State will be about a million and a half dollars more for this year than 1913. Although the assessment shows an increase, it is not an increase in the valuation of the property, but due to the natural growth of the corporations will be on the roll this year because their ten-year exemption has expired.

Mr. Frank J. Sullivan has been checked in as agent for the L. R. & N. Co. at this place, vice Mr. J. S. Edmonds. Mr. Sullivan worked in the Colfax depot for two years or more as cashier and was transferred to the auditing department in Shreveport the first of this year. His promotion to the Colfax depot is a recognition of his service, and his friends are glad to know that he has been placed in charge of an office that is said to be surpassed for business on the L. R. & N. line only by the New Orleans depot.

The trial of W. C. Walters, the stove tinker, charged with kidnapping Bobbie Dunbar, has been in progress at Opelousas all this week, and the newspaper accounts say the case will be given to the jury by Friday or Saturday.
