

"HAIL HIM! HAIL HIM!" EARTH'S NEW KING

"They Knew Not the Time of
Their Visitation."

**Palm Sunday Portends Momentous
Events—Jesus' Triumphant Entry into
Jerusalem—Rejected by the Nation.
He Rejected the Nation—Correspondences
Between Messiah's First and
Second Advents—Jewish Nation and
Christendom Dealt With as Type and
Antitype—Christendom Now Under-
going Test—Weighed In the Scales.**



New York City, March 28th.—Pastor Russell spoke today at the New York City Temple, W. 63d St., near Broadway. His text was, "Hosanna; Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord."—Mark 11:9. The momentous importance of the event which Christians commemorate on Palm Sunday was not understood by the Jews at the time of our Lord's First Advent.

The Jewish Sabbath had been spent in rest at Bethany. It was the next morning, corresponding to our Sunday, that Jesus made his triumphant entry into the city of Jerusalem as the Jewish King.

The incident had been foretold by the Prophet in detail, saying, "Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion; shout, O daughter of Jerusalem; behold, thy King cometh unto thee: He is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass."—Zechariah 9:9.

The awakening of Lazarus from death had brought a large concourse of people from Jerusalem to see Jesus. They were filled with enthusiasm and, after the custom of the time, many strewed palm branches in the way, while others spread their garments.

Prophecy Must Be Fulfilled.
The people shouted as the Prophet had foretold. They hailed Jesus as their long-promised King, the Messiah. On other occasions, when attempts were made to hail the Master thus, He withdrew Himself, because the Father's time was not yet due.

But now the appointed time had come, and hence, instead of hiding, He encouraged their enthusiasm. Prominent sectarian Jews were present, who, although unable to account for Jesus' raising of Lazarus, were loath to accept Him as the true Messiah; and when they heard the shouts of the multitude, they sent word requesting that He restrain them.

But instead of forbidding them, Jesus intimated that it was proper for them to do so. The Prophet had said, "Shout, O daughter of Jerusalem!" and there must be a shout.

Enroute to Jerusalem the Master halted the procession on the summit of the Mount of Olives, which overlooks the Holy City, and wept, while pronouncing His sentence.

Knew Not the Time of Their Visitation.
Apparently the nation was unprepared as at first for the Messiah; hence the familiar words, "Behold, your House is left unto you desolate! For I say unto you, Ye shall not see Me henceforth till ye shall say, Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord!" That Day is almost here! Meantime the nation has been cast off.

If thus we have before our minds the origin of Palm Sunday and what it signified, as the climax of the test of Natural Israel in respect to the acceptance of their Messiah, we are prepared to go further and to note that in God's providence there is a similar test for us Christians.

The Pastor called attention to the fact that while Israel as a nation was rejected, there was a small, faithful remnant who accepted Christ and thus became the nucleus or foundation of Spiritual Israel on the Day of Pentecost. Thus, so far as respects the Spiritual part of God's great promise to Abraham, it passed forever from the reach of the Jewish nation; but there still remains for them a glorious earthly portion, to which they will be introduced at Jesus' Second coming.

The Time of Our Visitation.
Apparently very few of Spiritual Israel, until recently, noticed that it has had a history parallel to that of Natural Israel. Few indeed have seen that these two Israels have been dealt with as Type and Antitype. Small has been the number who have noticed that from the death of Jacob to the death of Jesus finds its exact parallel of 1847½ years between the death of Jesus and our day.

Few have noticed that in both Natural Israel and in Spiritual Israel there have been both a nominal and a real Israel. The nominal Jewish system was tried and all but the "Israelites indeed" failed. Likewise will be the experience of Spiritual Israel. The nominal Christian systems will be tried, and all in them will fall except the faithful spirit-begotten.

The Lord through the Prophet foretold that Messiah would be "for a stone of stumbling to both the Houses of Israel"—to Natural Israel and to Spiritual Israel. Many things indicate that we are living in a time corresponding to that Palm Sunday! Ours is Palm Sunday in the highest sense of all! How are we receiving the great blessings which betoken the parousia of the Master?

AN ORDINANCE.

Whereas more than one-fourth of the property taxpayers of Road District Number Seven of Grant parish, Louisiana, eligible to vote in a tax election in said district of said parish, have petitioned the police jury to order an election in said district to determine whether or not a special five mills tax for five years, beginning with the year 1915 and ending with the year 1919, shall be levied and collected on all the property in said district subject to taxation, for the purpose of maintaining the public roads in said District No. 7; and

Whereas, it is the opinion of this body that the contemplated maintenance of public roads is for the public welfare; and

Whereas, aside from said petition, it is the voluntary will of this body to call the election herein provided for; and

Whereas Article 293 of the Constitution of 1913 authorizes the levying and collection of such a tax on the property of Road District Number Seven, when authorized at an election held for this purpose; and

Whereas Act 256 of 1910, and amendments, provides the method of holding such election; now, therefore,

Section 1—
Be it ordained by the police jury of Grant parish, Louisiana, in regular session convened, That an election is hereby called to be held in Road District Number Seven of this parish at Montgomery precinct and Verda precinct on Monday, April 5th, 1915, at which election a majority of the property taxpayers of said road district, in number and amount, eligible to vote and voting shall determine the proposition to levy a five mills tax on all the taxable property in said Road District Number Seven in said parish for the period of five years, beginning with the year 1915 and ending with the year 1919, for the purpose of building and maintaining the public roads in said Road District Number Seven.

Section 2—
Be it further ordained, That the clerk of the police jury is instructed to prepare for use at said election a sufficient number of ballots, on each of which shall be printed substantially the provisions mentioned in section one of this ordinance, to-wit:

PROPOSITION.
Proposition to levy a five mills tax on all the property in Road District Number Seven, Grant parish, Louisiana, for a period of five years, beginning with the year 1915 and ending with the year 1919, both years inclusive, for the purpose of building and maintaining the public roads in said Road District Number Seven, Grant parish, Louisiana.

NOTICE TO VOTER.
To vote in favor of the proposition submitted on this ballot place a cross (X) mark in the square after the word "Yes." To vote against the proposition place a similar mark in the square after the word "No."

Taxable valuation, \$.....
Signature of voter.....

Section 3—
Be it further ordained, That the clerk of the police jury is instructed to be prepared for use at said election all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, registrar's lists of property taxpayers eligible to vote in said election and the valuation of their property, blank lists for entering the names of those who actually voted at said election, and compiled statement blanks for compiling the votes in number and amount.

Section 4—
Be it further ordained, That the compensation of the election commissioners at said election shall be three dollars per day for one day, for the clerk three dollars per day for one day, for the returning officer three dollars per day for three days, and the said election shall be held at the following polling places and by the officers here named, each being a registered voter:

At Montgomery Precinct—J. H. Wardlow, R. A. Sellers and R. A. Woods, commissioners; H. H. Horn, clerk; E. W. Rodgers, returning officer.
At Verda Precinct—Milton O'Quinn, D. O. Morris and G. D. Smith, commissioners; L. B. Woods, clerk; C. J. Hutchinson, returning officer.

Section 5—
Be it further ordained, That notice of this election containing the proposition herein submitted to the voters shall be prepared and signed by the president and secretary of the police jury and shall be published in the official journal four weekly insertions, the date of the first insertion to be not less than thirty days before the date of the election. The said notice shall further recite that on Tuesday, the 6th day of April, 1915, at 12 o'clock noon, the police jury will meet at the court house in Colfax, in said parish, and there in public session open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots both as to number and amount, and examine and count the returns and declare the result of said election and promulgate the same.

AN ORDINANCE.

Be it ordained by the police jury of Grant parish, Louisiana, That at the election called to be held on the 5th day of April, 1915, in Road District Number Seven the voters of the said district shall elect two citizens of said district to be road commissioners, who in association with the member of the police jury for ward seven shall constitute a board of road commissioners for said road district, the member of the police jury to be chairman of said board, and the two members who shall be elected shall serve until July, 1920. It shall be the duty of this board of road commissioners to exercise supervision of all road work and all expenditures on account of road work in said district, subject to the public regulations and ordinances of the police jury and the laws of the State.

Be it further ordained, That the members of the board of commissioners shall receive in compensation for their services \$2.50 per diem for the time actually employed in the discharge of their duties.
