Be it known, That on this 1st day of May, A. D. 1915, before me, Earl Roberts, a duly qualified Notary Public in and for the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, personally came and appeared the hereinafter mentioned subscribers and incorporators, who declared unto me, Notary, in the presence of the undersigned competent witnesses:

That they do hereby unite to form a stock corporation under the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I.  
The name of the corporation is COLFAX OIL AND GAS COMPANY, INCORPORATED.

ARTICLE II.  
The purpose for which the corporation is formed is the boring and mining for oil, gas, sulphur, salt, coal and all other minerals of any kind, nature, or description, and in connection with this main purpose to acquire by purchase, lease, donation, or otherwise, lands, mineral rights in lands, and minerals and the same to explore, exploit and develop, to drill, sink, and otherwise dispose of oil, gas, and minerals of all kinds; and to do and perform all things necessary, proper, or in any wise incidental to engaging in the business of oil, gas, and other mining and development and traffic in the same for profit in and out of the State of Louisiana.

ARTICLE III.  
The amount of capital stock of this corporation is Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$12,500.00), more than fifty per cent (50%) of which has been subscribed.

ARTICLE IV.  
The capital stock may be increased to the amount of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars.

ARTICLE V.  
The number of shares of which said capital stock shall consist shall be Five Hundred (500) Shares, and the par value of each share shall be Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars.

ARTICLE VI.  
The domicile of the corporation shall be the Town of Colfax, in the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana.

Mitchell, Vice President; and said J. E. Swafford, Secretary-Treasurer. A majority of the Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any and all business, transacted by the board caused by anything other than the expiration of the term, shall be filled by the remaining Directors.

ARTICLE IX.  
The names and postal addresses of the subscribers of these articles of incorporation, and a statement of the number of shares of stock which each agrees to take in the corporation are as follows:

ARTICLE X.  
All the powers of this corporation are hereby invested in its Board of Directors.

ARTICLE XI.  
This corporation shall have succession by its corporate name for its said period of duration; shall sue and be sued by its corporate name in any court of competent jurisdiction; shall make and use a common seal and alter the same at pleasure; shall have power to acquire property by grant, gift, purchase, devise, or bequest, and to lease, hold, dispose of, mortgage and pledge the same, and exercise all other proprietary rights in and to the same, subject only to such limitations as may be prescribed by law; this corporation shall have power to appoint such officers and agents as the business of this corporation may require and to fix their compensation to make by-laws, to wind up and dissolve itself according to law, to conduct its business in the State of Louisiana and all other States and Territories of the United States, and to hold stock in other corporations as permitted by law.
