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Official Proceedings of the Police Jury of Grant Parish.

Colfax, La., July 5, 1915.
The police jury met pursuant to adjournment. All members were present. The minutes of the proceedings of the last three meetings were read and approved.

A petition was presented asking for the establishment of a public road leading from the Colfax-Rochelle model road at the Hinton place and returning to said model road at or below the gravel pit.

On motion the petition was granted, provided the said public road shall be opened without expense to the parish.

On motion it was agreed that the Sheriff be authorized and instructed to let and hire, Charles Kraft, prisoner for the sum of five dollars (\$5.00) per month until the said prisoner shall have paid one hundred and twenty-five dollars fine.

Mr. N. S. Roberts came before the police jury and requested that the fills or dumps on the Colfax-Montgomery model road across the Boggy Bayou and across the Bayou Confine be removed for the reason that they obstruct the flow of the water in said streams.

On motion a resolution was adopted instructing the clerk of the police jury, to call the attention of the State Highway department to the condition complained of by Mr. Roberts and other citizens affected by the obstructions placed in the Boggy Bayou and the Bayou Confine by reason of the construction of the Colfax-Montgomery highway.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved that, in view of the agitation in recent years with reference to the importation of foreigners into our country, it is the sense of the police jury that the public authorities of the State of Louisiana should not encourage the immigration of Asiatic labor into this State; that, on the contrary all necessary measures should be taken to discourage such immigration.

And be it further resolved, that the secretary is directed to forward a copy of these resolutions to the police jury of the parish of Terrebonne.

The committee appointed to review and locate the public road established, leading from M. C. Nugent's place on the Georgetown-Colfax road to a point on the Claiborne road near Saddle Bayou, reported to the police jury and asked to be discharged.

On motion the report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The police jury adjourned until 9 o'clock a. m. Tuesday July 6th, 1915.

The police jury met pursuant to adjournment.

R. W. Richardson, president and members Wm. LaCroix, O. L. Nugent, N. G. Morgan, O. C. Watson and K. M. Dunn were present.

A petition was presented asking that the public road established in September 1913, leading from Aloha by Shady Grove church to intersection of Colfax-Dartigo road, be changed so as to lead from Aloha to intersection Summerfield and Dartigo road at or near Welcome Home church.

The petition was granted and the following named citizens were appointed as a committee to review and locate the road as changed, leading from Hebron church to intersection Colfax-Rochelle model road at latt railroad crossing reported and on motion the report was accepted.

The petition asking for the creation of a public road leading from the place of W. A. Butts on the Claiborne road and passing the places L. E. Brister and Luther Chandler and crossing the Colfax-Pollock model road near Oak Grove church and intersecting the Colfax-Pineville road at the Bruce mill, action on which was refused at a former meeting, was again presented, and the petition granted. The following named citizens were appointed as a committee to review and locate said road and report to the police jury at the October session, viz: J. C. C. Fralick, L. E. Brister, J. T. Busby, T. J. Cosby, Luther Chandler, and Willie Chandler.

On motion the name of Albert Neal was placed on the pauper list and J. W. McIlwain was appointed as his agent.

On motion the president of the police jury was authorized to make warrants necessary to pay the freight on motor truck on the arrival of same and also to pay the amount then due on the purchase price of said truck.

The president was authorized to make a note in favor of the Bank of Colfax

in the sum of seven thousand and five hundred dollars (\$7500.00) to cover amounts of cash payments made by said Bank on account of the parish.

On motion the police jury proceeded to elect its officers for the ensuing year. Mr. R. W. Richardson was re-elected to continue to serve as president, Mr. R. S. Cameron to continue as clerk of the police jury and Mr. H. G. Goodwyn to continue as parish printer.

The police jury adjourned until 9:30 a. m. Wednesday July 14, 1915.

Spray for Tomato Blight.

Many a promising crop of tomatoes is destroyed by "blight" or some one of the other tomato diseases. There are three or four distinct diseases of the tomato fruit and vines, but to the casual observer these diseases usually appear as dark depressed spots upon the fruit or as a dying and drying up of the foliage.

Treatment is the same in all cases and is as follows: Spray the plants for the first time when they are 12 to 15 inches high and have become well established in the field, using strong Bordeaux mixture—that is, five pounds unslaked lime, five pounds of copper sulphate (blue stone) and 50 gallons of water. The copper sulphate and lime must each be dissolved separately and then diluted and mixed. Be sure to apply as a fine spray and do the work thoroughly. Repeat every two weeks until three to five applications have been made.—West Virginia Experiment Station.

Sweet Potatoes for Hogs.

Sweet potatoes planted in June and early July will be ready for feeding about the middle of October. Hogs turned on them at that time will probably root out more potatoes than they will eat, but there will not be very much loss from this. An acre of potatoes will feed eight to ten hogs, one year old, for sixty days, if supplemented by such feeds as rice polish and bran.

I believe that the sweet potato is the best root crop for fall and winter grazing for hogs and that the cut-over pine hill lands will likely develop as a hog-raising country for the reason that the soils are pre-eminently suited to the production of sweet potatoes, peanuts and cow peas, and also produce fairly good oats for winter grazing.—W. R. Dodson, Director Experiment Stations, Louisiana State University.

Danger For Good Roads.

New Orleans, June 17, 1915.

There will come up for hearing before the next meeting of the Railroad Commission to be held the latter part of this month, or early in July, a very important rate case affecting good roads building materials, such as sand, gravel, stone and shells, and should it be so unfortunate that the railroad companies succeed in getting the present high rates on these materials increased, it will mean that the good roads movement and metal surfaced road construction, together with concrete bridges and culverts, will be at an end in this State, requiring years to recover from such a set back. To forego such a danger to the people at this time, it behooves every public spirited citizen and official to thwart the unjust application of said railroad companies for an increase in rates on good roads materials, and you are respectfully requested and urged to petition the Railroad Commission not to err in rendering their decision.

Considering the great and many benefits to be derived by the railroad companies in the increased tonnage of agricultural products, and the development of our State due to the construction of good roads in which these materials are used, it is obvious that should any changes in the rates on this good roads material be made at all, the question of decrease, and not of increase, should be considered, and that a flat rate of ten dollars per car should be the maximum on all good roads building materials, such as the above, to any point in the State.

To set aside one mill per annum of the general parochial tax levy for the years 1915, 1916 and 1917, levied and to be levied by the police jury of the parish of Grant, Louisiana, for said years, for the construction, maintaining and repairing of the public roads and bridges of the parish during said years, and to appropriate out of said one mill so set aside for said years whatever part thereof is necessary for the payment of the principal and interest of certain certificates of indebtedness given to the White Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, by order of this body to pay the remainder of the purchase price of a certain good roads truck purchased by this body of said company.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, in special session convened:

Section 1. Whereas by Article 292 of the constitution of the State of Louisiana, adopted in the year 1913, the police juries of the several parishes of the State of Louisiana are authorized and empowered to set aside at least one mill of the taxes per annum levied by them in order to raise funds for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and repairing the public roads and bridges of the parishes, and whereas it is necessary and advisable, and the public service and interests require the construction of additional public roads in the parish of Grant, and the maintenance and repair of the public roads already constructed in the parish, and whereas in the opinion of this body the public interests and the public service will be subserved and facilitated, and such construction, maintenance and repair hastened and rendered more certain by the purchase of a good roads truck for use in such work, and whereas this body has made such purchase of the White Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, paying a part in cash, and agreeing to pay the remainder of the price on credit as follows: Eight hundred dollars on February 1st, 1915, and seventeen hundred dollars on February 1st, 1917, with five per cent interest per annum on such deferred payments until paid; and whereas this body has this day authorized and by this ordinance authorizes the president of this body, R. W. Richardson, to sign, and whereas he has so signed certificates of indebtedness of this body, dated Colfax, La., June 7, 1915, payable to the order of the White Company aforesaid for said deferred or credit payments to be made for the amounts, with interest and maturities, as above stated; now, therefore,

Section 2: Be it further ordained, That one mill of the general parochial tax levied and to be levied by the police jury of the parish of Grant, Louisiana, for the years 1915, 1916 and 1917 be and the same is hereby set aside to raise a fund for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and repairing the public roads and bridges of the parish of Grant for said years, and so much of said fund as may be necessary thereof be and the same is hereby set aside for the payment of the principal and interest of the certificates of indebtedness owing to the White Company aforesaid, to-wit: Eight hundred dollars due February 1st, 1915, and seventeen hundred dollars due February 1st, 1917, together with five per cent per annum interest on each of said certificates from date thereof until paid.

Be it further ordained, That said certificates of indebtedness shall be in the following form, numbered 1, 2, 3, in order of their maturities for the amounts above stated, to-wit:
