

# THE JUDGMENT DAY PICTURED BY JESUS

Mankind Coming Forth From  
the Tomb In Answer  
to Prayer.

Parable Applies to the Millennium—Cooperation With Christ In Raising the Dead—Two Classes Gradually Developed—Both Will Outwardly Keep God's Law—Selfishness the Controlling Principle With the Goat Class. Fire of Divine Anger Will Destroy Sin and Selfishness Forever.



Sept. 19.—Pastor Russell spoke as usual today. His very able sermon was based on the text, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me."—Matthew 25:40.

The parable of the Sheep and the Goats refers to the world in general, not to the Church, the Pastor declared. During Messiah's reign, all nations shall be gathered before the Judgment Throne; and Messiah shall separate them, as a shepherd divides sheep from goats. For a thousand years the world's judgment will progress, and will demonstrate who desire to come into harmony with God and who prefer to be wayward, goat-like. This separation is individual. In the parable the sheep class are pictured as gradually gathered to the right hand of the great Judge—the place of favor—and the goat class to the place of disfavor. Not until the conclusion of their trial will these classes find out just where they stand.—Verses 37 and 38.

Throughout the Millennium the Messiah will deal with all mankind, the majority of whom are now in the great prison-house of death. Speaking of the resurrection, St. Paul says that they will come forth "every man in his own order." (1 Corinthians 15:21-23.) The Church will come forth first, then the Great Company—two classes on the spirit plane. Next will come forth the Ancient Worthies, to be earthly representatives of the spiritual, invisible Heavenly Kingdom. Our Lord told some in His day, "Ye shall see Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and all the Prophets in the Kingdom of God." But He said nothing about their seeing Himself or His disciples. On the contrary He said, "A little while, and the world seeth Me no more."—Luke 13:28; John 14:19; 1 John 3:1.

### "Every Man In His Own Order."

Pastor Russell then explained the manner of the resurrection of mankind, and gave Scriptures to corroborate his conclusions. During the Millennium our Lord will have power to raise the dead. (John 5:28, 29.) As He prayed for the restoration of Lazarus because he was the brother of Martha and Mary, so it is very probable that nearly all will come forth in answer to the prayers of their relatives and friends. When restitution work shall have progressed so far that the world is in good shape and more is being produced than is needed, then Messiah will inform mankind that they may have the privilege of co-operating with Him in this work.

The sheep class of that Age will consist of those who have the Lord's disposition. As it will be His purpose to bring humanity back from death and to prepare the willing and obedient for life everlasting, all the sheep will gladly co-operate. Their prayers will go up for those who are in the prison-house of death. As these come forth, the sheep class will lovingly help them, feed and clothe them, etc. This work will continue through the Millennial Age, and thus mankind will come into harmony with God.

There will be another class, the speaker showed, that will have no interest in this work, but will manifest a selfish disposition. God does not purpose, however, that those who are selfish shall have everlasting life. Selfishness is a result of sin. Mankind were born selfish. But as they begin to see God's way, those in true heart sympathy with the Lord will cultivate the spirit of love.

### The Punishment of the Selfish.

After the sheep class have provided for those first recovered from death, they will pray for the restoration of life to others. Thus they will take pleasure in co-operating with God and Christ, and will be developing noble, Christlike characters. At the end of the Millennium this class will be given the kingdom of earth, prepared for mankind from the foundation of the world—a world-wide Paradise. The Church, on the contrary, is to share with her Lord a Heavenly Kingdom, prepared from before the foundation of the world.—Genesis 1:26-28; 1 Corinthians 15:24; Ephesians 1:4-12.

The goat class will "go away into everlasting punishment." The Greek word here rendered punishment is *kolasia*, meaning to restrain by cutting off. The goat class will be finally cut off from life, but not until they have had all the blessings of the Millennial Age. They will not have violated the Divine Law outwardly, which merely requires that they shall not injure another. But not having acquired the spirit of love, they will not be fit for life everlasting. They will be destroyed with Satan and all who manifest his selfish spirit. The fire of Divine anger will destroy them.

AN ORDINANCE  
Providing for the issuance of sixteen thousand five hundred (\$16,500) dollars of five per cent road bonds in behalf of road district number five of the parish of Grant:

Whereas, the police jury of the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, did on June 7, 1915, order a special election to be held on July 12, 1915, in road district number five of the parish of Grant for the purpose of taking the sense of the qualified voters on the proposition of issuing bonds in the sum of sixteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$16,500) and said election was favorable to the issuance of said bonds, and the police jury met on July 14, 1915, and promulgated the returns of said election,

Therefore, be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, That the president of the police jury of the parish of Grant be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver to the purchaser thereof bonds of the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, on behalf of road district number five, payable to bearer in the aggregate sum of sixteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$16,500), all in the denomination of five hundred (\$500) good roads bonds and numbered from one to thirty-three inclusive, all dated September 1, 1915, and maturing serially, as follows:

- Numbers 1 to 5, inclusive, on May 1, 1916.
- Numbers 6 to 10, inclusive, on May 1, 1917.
- Numbers 11 to 15, inclusive, on May 1, 1918.
- Numbers 16 to 20, inclusive, on May 1, 1919.
- Numbers 21 to 26, inclusive, on May 1, 1920.
- All of said bonds bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of May and November of each and every year until final payment of the principal sums thereof, except that the
