Senator Harper Announces His Candidacy for Re-Election.

To the People of the 27th Senatorial District:

In announcing myself as candidate for the position of State Senator for this district for the next four years, I wish to state that words fail to express how much I appreciate the confidence you reposed in me four years ago, by electing me to the very important and responsible position mentioned, and I now shall mention a few things I stand for.

First—We have among us a large number of people known as a public working class, who in the near future will be left among us without jobs and without homes. They will be dependent upon us for homes, and for them to be useful citizens they must have homes; but how they are to get them, when all the public lands have been taken up already is the question to be solved. At present I know of no way except through the rural credit system. The rural credit system does not mean that the people will be given or loaned money with which to buy merchandise, but to secure homes on long terms and at a low rate of interest, so that any energetic, economical person can secure a home.

Second—I believe our school system needs to be brought more under the control of the local boards of trustees, and considerable amount of the red tape under which it is to-day cut out. We need more practical business in our schools. It is taking too long and is costing too much for a child to get an education. We are educating our children away from the farms, which only adds myre people to the roving class. The parish superintendents of public education should be elected by the people.

Third—I believe in a minimum wage system. No person should be forced to work at such a low wage that there would be no chance with the greatest of economy that he or she could not lay up something with which to meet a "rainy day," or secure a home.

Fourth—While as your senator I voted for every local option bill that came up in the Senate, yet I recognize the fact that in many instances local option is not much

better than open saloons, therefore as a protection to local option communities, I favor state-wide prohibition, either by statute, or an amendment to our State Constitution.

Fifth—While in the rural districts woman suffrage may not be of so much importance, yet I believe if we had it, it would be the cause of many needed reforms being enacted into law, therefore I favor it.

Sixth—I believe the fee system should be abolished, and instead, salaries paid all public officials, so that the people could know how much each official would get.

Seventh—Our fertilizer and feed laws are not in the interest of the consumers, therefore I favor such laws as will absolutely protect them against fraud.

I could mention other things needful, but deem it unnecessary at this time. Thanking you for the confidence you have reposed in me as expressed at the polls four years ago, and thanking you in advance for your support at the Democratic primary to be held January 25, 1916, I remain,

FARM DEMONSTRATION WORK

ANOTHER DIPPING VAT.

On Monday night, October 11, a meeting of the progressive citizens in and around Dry Prong was held in the Woodmen hall and the "Dry Prong Dipping Vat Company" was organized. Permanent organization was gone into, a building committee was appointed, the site was selected, and instructions were issued to have the vat ready for the first dipping of cattle this fall, so as to have as few ticks as possible go through the winter.

The local farm demonstration agent was present at the meeting and explained the advantages of the dipping vat, and some of the precautions to observe in its use. A permanent stock company was organized in the amount of \$150 cash stock. It was agreed to sell stock at \$1 per share, and on the night of the meeting all shares were sold and about \$75 was paid in that night.

The following officers were elected: Dr. D. V. Donaldson, president; J. W. Smith, vice president; Odus Watson, secretary; T. B. Morgan, treasurer and chairman of the building committee. Plans and specifications for the vat were submitted by the local agent, and these plans being recommended by the government, they were adopted.

This is one more step in the campaign to KILL THE TICK. Citizens in the Dry Prong community saw the advantages of dipping cattle from the results obtained at Pollock, and did not rest satisfied until they had one in their own community. We may expect ten or twelve vats to be built in the parish during the coming winter. We have several now in operation. Mr. Farmer, what are you doing to help KILL THE TICK?
