Stewart Logging Co., Inc.

STATE OF LOUISIANA }
Parish of Washington }
Be it known and remembered that on this 3rd day of December, in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifteen, before me, Herman E. Gayer, a notary public, in and for Washington parish, Louisiana, and in the presence of the undersigned witnesses, personally came and appeared the persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who severally declare that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana governing the organization of corporations they do by these presents covenant and agree and bind themselves, as well as each other persons as may become hereafter associated with them, for the purpose of forming and constituting a corporation or body politic in law, for the object and purposes and under the stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.
The name and title of this corporation shall be STEWART LOGGING COMPANY, INCORPORATED, of Pollock, Grant parish, Louisiana, and shall have and enjoy succession and existence for a period of ninety-nine years from the date hereof, with all the powers, rights, privileges and immunities accorded to corporations under the law.

ARTICLE II.
The domicile of this corporation shall be in the city of Pollock, parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, where all citation and other legal process shall be served upon the president, and in case of the absence of the president upon the vice-president, and in case of absence of the vice president upon the secretary thereof in the manner provided by law.

ARTICLE III.
The objects and purposes for which this corporation is organized and the nature of the business to be carried on by it are hereby declared to be: To purchase, own, lease and otherwise acquire railroads, logging roads, tramways, teams, wagons and other logging equipment for the purpose of the transportation of logs, lumber, timber, and other wood products, and to make and engage in contracts and in the con-

tracting business for the transportation and delivery, etc., either of the crude or of the finished product; to purchase, own, lease, or otherwise acquire and operate saw mills, planing mills and other plants for the manufacture of timber, lumber, and other wood products; to purchase, own, lease or otherwise acquire timber, timbered lands, farm lands, and to sell the same, and to act as brokers or agents for the sale thereof; to purchase, own, lease or otherwise acquire stores, commissaries, etc., for the buying and selling, as wholesale or retail merchants, all kinds of general merchandise, and to operate as many branch stores and commissaries as may be deemed necessary for the business of this corporation, and generally to do and perform all such things as may be necessary, proper and convenient in connection with the above objects and purposes in the State of Louisiana or elsewhere as may be necessary by this corporation to carry out the object and purposes for which this corporation is organized.

ARTICLE IV.
The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars, divided into and represented by one hundred shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars each.

No transfer of stock shall be binding upon this corporation unless the same appears upon its books. The stockholders may, in the manner provided by law, from time to time, increase the capital stock of the corporation to such an amount as they may see fit, and may divide the stock into different classes, as they may determine, but the total amount shall not exceed the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars.

ARTICLE V.
The corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in a board of directors to be composed of not less than three persons and to be elected by the stockholders at a general meeting to be held on the first Monday in the month of November of each year, and each director shall be a stockholder of this corporation.

Until the selection as hereinabove provided, the following shall constitute the first board of directors, viz: A. W. Stewart, C. A. Stewart and M. L. Stewart, the postoffice address of each of said persons being Pollock, Grant parish, Louisiana; of which A. W. Stewart shall be president, C. A. Stewart vice president, and M. L. Stewart secretary and treasurer.

ARTICLE VI.
At the termination of this charter, or in case of the dissolution of this corporation, its affairs shall be liquidated by three stockholders acting as liquidation commissioners, to be selected at a general meeting of the stockholders.

C. A. Stewart, one of the incorporators of this corporation, hereby subscribes for ten (10) shares of the capital stock of said corporation and has this day paid to said corporation the sum of one thousand (\$1000.00) dollars cash therefor.

M. L. Stewart, one of the incorporators of this corporation, hereby subscribes for twenty (20) shares of the capital stock of said corporation and has this day paid to said corporation the sum of two thousand (\$2000.00) dollars cash therefor.

A. W. Stewart, one of the incorporators of this corporation, hereby subscribes for thirty (30) shares of the capital stock of said corporation, and in payment therefor has this day transferred to the said corporation in full settlement for said stock, the following described property, to-wit:

Four (4) log wagons complete and fifteen (15) yoke of oxen \$2900 00
One (1) cart, drums and grab 121 00
One (1) mule, wagon and harness 250 00
One (1) buggy and harness 90 00
Two (2) tarpaulins 16 00

One (1) lot of shop tools and wagon material 138 00
