Big Gas Pressure at Wild Cat Well.]
The Wild Cat Development Co. have their oil well down to a depth of a little over 1700 feet, and for the last two or three days this week a very heavy gas pressure has been developed. Their derrick is about 80 feet high, and when they have their pipe hoisted to its top the gas forces the mud out at the top of the pipe full 80 feet from the ground. The promoters of the enterprise are in high glee over the indications, and they confidently expect to strike oil within the next 400 or 500 feet.

Proclamation of Special School Tax Election for Ward Six.

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Board of School Directors of the parish of Grant, Louisiana, at its meeting held on the 13th day of May, 1916, I, John H. McNeely, president of said board, hereby give notice that in compliance with said resolution a special election will be held in ward six of Grant parish, Louisiana, on Tuesday, June 27, 1916, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the laws of Louisiana to vote at special school tax elections, the following proposition, to-wit:

PROPOSITION
To levy a five mills special tax on all property subject to State taxation in ward six, of Grant parish, Louisiana, for a period of five years, beginning with the year 1916 and ending with the year 1920, both years inclusive, for building, maintaining and paying incidental fees for schools in ward six and to build and maintain two two-room schools, one at Aloha and one at Shady Grove.

The polling place for holding the said election shall be Aloha, in the said ward, of Grant parish Louisiana, and that J. W. Fletcher, W. M. Stewart and Albert Elias shall serve as commissioners of the said election, and that F. P. Bullitt shall serve as clerk of the said election.

The polls shall be opened at seven o'clock a. m. and close at five o'clock p. m., and the election shall be conducted in accordance with the election law governing such elections.

Notice is also given that at 12 o'clock m. on Wednesday, June 28, 1916, the said board of school directors of the parish of Grant, Louisiana, will meet at their office in the court house at Colfax, Louisiana, and in open session proceed to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of said election.
