Letters from Our Soldier Boys.

We have a couple of letters from our boys in Germany, but as we are crowded for time and space can only make extracts from each instead of printing the entire letters.

Private John D. Valentine writes March 5 from Mendt, Germany, to his brother Ellis, and says that he saw Ab Irwin, who is in the 7th Field Artillery band. He also incloses a 6-page type written official report of the record of his division, (the first,) since it arrived in France June, 1917, to Dec. 14, 1918, when it was in Germany. The report names fifty different towns and cities, etc., where the division was located, giving the date it was at each, and names eleven engagements it was in; also giving the number of killed and wounded in each battle, together with the number of prisoners, cannon and machine guns captured in each action.

The other letter is from Randall Deen to his brother Arthur Deen, dated at Menouial, Germany, March 4. He says he sees where 951,000 troops in all are billeted out for the U. S., and still his division is not in it, so he does not expect his time to come until July or later. He remarks that O. J. Williams came over on the same ship with him, and he is back at home now, but still all were anxious to see Germany, and he doesn't regret staying, but he sure wants to come home some time. He has seen old forts and churches all the way from one to two thousand years old. There is one built 55 years before Christ, (B. C. 55), and it is still there. Also there are churches that were sacked by the French 800 and 900 years ago, and still remain just like they were the day it was done, never having been repaired, and never will be.
