

Court Proceedings.

Cases disposed of at a session of court held last Friday, April 8, are as follows:

Lizzie Aaron vs. D. F. Aaron, absolute divorce granted. Elmer E. Sparrow, emancipation granted on written consent of his mother, relieving petitioner of all disabilities attached to minors.

L. Fredieu, convicted of assault and battery, fined \$10 and costs. Sentence suspended pending good behavior for 6 months.

Jesse Bernstein, convicted of carrying concealed weapon, fined \$125 and costs and 30 days in jail, in default of payment to serve 30 days additional.

Nolle prosequi were entered in the cases of Lewis Chelette, charged with larceny, and Ernest Blackburn, charged with non-support.

Edward Fredieu et als, juveniles, charged with malicious mischief, released on probation.

Ben Peters, charged with the murder of Euka Crockett in Colfax on March 1 of this year, entered a plea of guilty to manslaughter and was sentenced to the penitentiary for not less than 15 years nor more than 20 years.

In the matter of creating a registry of the court and designating a fiscal agent, it was ordered that the Bank of Colfax be designated and made the fiscal agent and depository for Grant parish, in accordance with Act No. 246 of 1920.

The docket for the April session having been cleared, court adjourned sine die.

Sweet Potato Specialist Inspects Local Curing Plant.

M. Hull, sweet potato specialist of the Extension Department at Baton Rouge was in Colfax last week, and in company with Parish Agent Sloan inspected the storage house of the Colfax Sweet Potato Co., and called upon parties interested in building farm storage houses.

Mr. Hull reports that the potatoes stored in the local plant are in splendid condition, that the percentage of loss, especially in those dug before frost, will be almost negligible. This speaks well for the management he says considering the unusual warm winter.

"There is an unusual interest," continued Mr. Hull, "being displayed on the part of the farmer in the building of farm storage houses to store that part of his crop which he will use at home and sell in his local market. There is nothing complicated or mysterious about the curing of sweet potatoes. Thorough ventilation immediately following storage together with a little heat to take care of excess moisture is all that is needed. Any ordinary stove will supply the heat, no expensive equipment is necessary. More than 100 houses are at present in operation in the state and in no case have failures been reported where instructions have been carried out."

Complete blue prints for the building of these houses can be secured free of charge by applying to the parish agent. Mr. Sloan also advises that he will be glad to render such assistance as might be necessary during the construction of these houses and throughout the curing period of the potatoes.
