Negro Sheriff Forgot to Hang His Sentence Commuted to Life.

Baton Rouge, La., April 20.—Lonnie Eaton, the negro of Monroe whom the sheriff of Ouachita parish forgot to hang on the date fixed by the governor, will not be hanged at all. The pardon board tonight, after hearing the case in full, rendered a decision commuting his death sentence to life imprisonment. Prominent white people of north Louisiana interested themselves in the case and appealed for clemency.

### Lads Arrested for Stealing Motor Car.

Eight lads ranging from about 15 to 22 years in age were arrested at Verda this week and placed in the Colfax jail, charged with breaking a lock and stealing a railroad motor car. The names and ages of the boys are L. B. Woods, Jr., 22; Grady Boyett, 22; Jabe Pool, 21; Olan Pool, 18; Milton Dixon, 17; John Williams, 16; Robert Burns, 15; L. G. O'Neal, Jr., 15. Bonds were furnished by all of the boys except Milton Dixon, and they were released to await the action of the grand jury.

Numerous thefts have been committed at Verda in the past few months, and we are informed that one of the boys arrested has implicated several of his pals in the motor car escapade in numerous thieving expeditions in and around the Verda community.

### Boy Scout Movement Started.

Thirty-two very enthusiastic and earnest boys between the ages of 12 and 18 met at the high school auditorium Tuesday evening and under the direction of Mr. Smith, of the State Department of Agriculture, and Miss Eudie Kavanaugh, Home Demonstration Agent for this parish, organized a troop of Boy Scouts. The Scout Committee which has agreed to serve for the town and which will have the direction of the boys in charge is composed of Judge J. A. Williams, J. H. McNeely and W. A. Brownlee.

The scouts will meet regularly every Thursday night, and until further notice the meetings will be held at the school building. Mr. R. C. Bennett will act as scoutmaster, assisted by Mr. Tom Randle and Dr. Earl Jones. If more boys are enlisted than is possible to handle in one troop, another will be organized.

For the present the following patrol leaders were selected:

No. 1, Flying Eagle Patrol—Lucian Dean, leader; Albert Tumminello, assistant.

No. 2, Stag Patrol—Merrill Goodwyn, leader; Tony Tumminello, assistant.

No. 3, Rattlesnake Patrol—Louis G. Tumminello, leader; Louis H. Tumminello, assistant.

No. 4, Black Bear Patrol—Jack Givens, leader; Edenborn LaCroix, assistant.

The scout movement had its beginning in England and has spread to all the English speaking people. Its object is to make all-round men of the raw material—the boy. It has the endorsement of every wide-awake business man, minister, teacher and citizen. Honor, obedience, self-reliance, the cardinal points of good citizenship, are presented to the boy in the way that will make him grasp the lessons and apply them to his daily life. The scout motto is "Be Prepared," and he is taught to be prepared for any emergency.

There will no doubt be solicitations from the committee and the boys for financial help in getting the movement started, and it would be well for each citizen to remember that money spent in developing boys is not a gift, nor is it without return, but is an investment whose dividends are manhood and good citizenship.

### Ex-Soldiers Can Get Victory Medal Through Local Post A. L.

The War Department is making a special drive to place the Victory Medal into the hands of former soldiers who served in the army during the World War. Many of these men think that the Victory Medal is the same as the Victory Button, which it is not. Everything possible is being done consistent with the value of the medal to facilitate its distribution.

The department is going to great trouble to give out these medals for it knows that in years to come the men will want them, or at least their relatives will, as is evidenced by the fact that of the deceased soldiers entitled to it, 90% of their relatives have applied for and received this decoration in the State of Louisiana. The machinery for distribution exists now for procuring the medal in the easiest way consistent with its value. Every soldier can get his Victory Medal by taking his discharge to the next meeting of his local post of the American Legion. The Adjutant will apply by proxy and return the discharge promptly.




