Official Proceedings of the Police Jury of Grant Parish.

Colfax, La., Aug. 16, 1921.
Proceedings of the police jury of the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, taken at an adjourned meeting of the said police jury held at Colfax, Louisiana, on the 16th day of August, 1921.

The Police jury of the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, met in adjourned session at the court house at Colfax, Louisiana, at ten (10) o'clock a. m. on the 16th day of August, 1921, pursuant to a motion of adjournment on the 10th day of August, 1921.

There were present, President John Randolph and the following members: W. B. Corley, J. W. Bryant, F. E. Lemoine, W. L. Nugent, J. C. C. Fralick, J. M. Jones.

There were absent: None.

The president duly convened the police jury and announced the purpose of the adjournment from the meeting held on August 10, 1921, was for the consideration and decision with respect to the bids submitted at ten (10:00) o'clock a. m. on the 10th day of August, 1921, for the purchase of \$570,000.00 of Road Bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, in accordance with an ordinance of the said police jury adopted on the 5th day of July, 1921, and the notice of the President calling for bids for the purchase of said bonds, also of date July 5, 1921.

The following ordinance was offered by Mr. J. M. Jones and seconded by Dr. W. B. Corley. An ordinance providing for the sale of \$570,000 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, authorized at an election held in said Road District on the 16th day of March, 1920.

Whereas, in accordance with the terms of an ordinance adopted by the police jury on the 5th day of July, 1921, and notice of the President of the police jury of the Parish of Grant, also of date July 5, 1921, calling for bids for the purchase of \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, there were received two (2) bids in accordance with the above, that of Messrs. Sutherland, Barry & Co., of New Orleans, Louisiana, of par and accrued interest, and that of Messrs. M. W. Elkins & Co., of Little Rock, Arkansas, who bid par and accrued interest and a premium of \$1,000.00; and

Whereas, on motion duly offered, seconded and carried, the police jury of the Parish of Grant adjourned to the 16th day of August, 1921, for the consideration of said bids; and

Whereas, after the due consideration and deliberation, the bid of Messrs. M. W. Elkins & Co., of Little Rock, Arkansas, is in the opinion of this police jury deemed the best bid and the one most advantageous to Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant; now,

Therefore, be it ordained by the police jury of the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, acting as the governing authority of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, that the bid of Messrs. M. W. Elkins & Co., of Little Rock, Arkansas, for the purchase of \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District No. Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, dated July 1, 1920, and authorized at an election held in said Road District on the 16th day of March, 1920, be and the same is hereby accepted, which bid is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

Colfax, Louisiana, Aug. 10, 1921.
To the Honorable Police Jury, Parish of Grant, Louisiana, Colfax, La.

Gentlemen:—For the \$570,000.00 serial bonds, of Road District Number Nine (9), Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, dated July 1, 1920, bearing interest at the rate of five (5%) per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, principal and interest payable at the Chase National Bank, New York, N. Y., maturing serially January 1, 1921, to January 1, 1960, inclusive, we will pay you the par value thereof and accrued interest and a premium of \$1,000.00 to date of delivery under the following conditions:

1. You are to deliver us these bonds within thirty days from this date, said bonds are to have the final approving unqualified legal opinion of Mr. Jhon C. Thomson, Bond Attorney, of New York, N. Y., covering the proceeding leading up to their issuance and the sale thereof.

2. It is understood that we are purchasing these bonds on a financial statement rendered us by the clerk of your police jury.

3. Certified check is enclosed you as a guarantee of our good faith to be retained by you pending our compliance with our contract and to be forfeited to the police jury in the event we fail to carry out the conditions of our contract.

Be it further ordained, etc., that the president and the clerk of the police jury of the Parish of Grant and the treasurer of the Parish of Grant, ex-officio treasurer of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to make delivery of the said bonds to the successful bidder, Messrs. M. W. Elkins & Co., of Little Rock, Arkansas, and to collect the purchase price thereof.

Be it further ordained, etc., that the treasurer of the Parish of Grant, and ex-officio treasurer of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, shall furnish and execute a special bond in the amount of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars for the faithful performance of his duties as treasurer of the said road district.

Be it further ordained, etc., that the Bank of Colfax, of Colfax, Louisiana, be and the same is hereby designated as the fiscal agent for the funds derived from the sale of the \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District No. Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, the said bank being the fiscal agent of the Parish of Grant, and having executed and furnished to this police jury satisfactory surety for all public funds now on deposit and to be deposited in said bank, and that said surety so executed and furnished is acceptable and agreeable to this police jury.

This ordinance having been submitted to a vote, the vote thereon was as follows:

The following ordinance was offered by _____ and seconded by Mr. _____.

An ordinance designating the place of payment of the principal and interest of an issue of bonds in amount of \$570,000 of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, that the places of payment of the principal and interest of the \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the Parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, authorized at a special election held in said road district on the 16th day of March, 1920, and provided for by an ordinance adopted by the police jury of the Parish of Grant on the 17th day of March, 1920, be and they are hereby designated as payable at the office of the treasurer of the Parish of Grant, at Colfax, Louisiana, or at the option of the holder at the Chase National Bank, of New York, N. Y.

This ordinance having been submitted to a vote, the vote thereon was as follows:

It was once much used by traders and Indians in that region, but is now nearly abandoned. Gill's "Dictionary of Chinook Jargon" was published in Portland, Ore., in 1891, and Boes' "Chinook Texts" in the Smithsonian report of the bureau of ethnology at Washington in 1894.

Proclamation of Election.

Proclamation for special school tax election for Dunn School District Number 22.

Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Grant Parish School Board at a special meeting held on the 15th day of August, 1921, I, J. H. McNeely, president of said board, hereby give notice that in compliance with said resolution a special election will be held in the Dunn School District No. 22, in Grant Parish, La., on Tuesday, September 27, 1921, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers, qualified to vote under the laws of Louisiana, the following proposition.

To levy a three (3) mills special tax for two years on all taxable property in Dunn School District No. 22, Grant Parish, La., said special tax to begin in the year 1921 and end in the year 1922, both years inclusive, for building purposes.

The place for holding the said election shall be the Ebenezer Camp Ground, Grant Parish, La., and J. N. Carter, C. C. Wilson and W. W. Greer shall act as commissioners and R. M. Dunn as clerk of the election.

The polls will be open at 7:30 a. m., and close at 5 p. m., and the election shall be conducted in accordance with the election laws of Louisiana applicable to special school elections.

Notice is also given that at 11 a. m. on Monday, October 3, 1921, the Grant parish school board shall meet at its offices in Colfax, Grant Parish, La., in open session, to open the ballot box, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, canvass the returns and declare the results.
