

Official Proceedings of the Police Jury of the Parish of Grant.

Colfax, La., Aug. 10, 1921.

The police jury of the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, met in special session at Colfax, La., on the 10th day of August, 1921, pursuant to the terms of an ordinance of the said police jury of date July 5, 1921, and the notice of the president calling for bids for the purpose of \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the parish of Grant, also of date July 5, 1921.

There were present:—President John Randolph, and members, W. B. Corley, J. W. Bryant, F. E. Lemoine, W. L. Nugent, J. C. C. Fralick and J. M. Jones.

There were absent:—None.

The president in the chair; the secretary at his desk. The police jury having been duly convened as the governing authority of Road District Number Nine (9), of the parish of Grant, the president announced that it was ten (10:00) o'clock a. m., the time fixed for the opening of the sealed bids for the purchase of \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9), of the Parish of Grant, and thereupon, it was moved by Dr. Corley and seconded by Mr. Jones, that the police jury do now proceed in open session to open and read the bids submitted for the purchase of the above road bonds.

The vote on this motion was as follows:

Yeas:—Randolph, Corley, Bryant, Lemoine, Nugent, Fralick and Jones.

Nays:—None.

And the motion was declared adopted.

The secretary then read the advertisement calling for bids for the purchase of the \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the parish

of Grant, which advertisement was authorized by an ordinance adopted by the police jury on the 5th day of July, 1921, and was published for thirty clear days in the Colfax Chronicle, the official journal of the parish of Grant, in accordance with the provisions of law. The secretary then stated that there had been received and he had in his possession two (2) bids, which were thereupon opened and read in open session, and were as follows:

1. The bid of Messrs. M. W. Elkins & Co., of Little Rock, Arkansas, offering par and accrued interest to date of delivery and a premium of \$1,000.00 for the \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9), of the parish of Grant.

2. The bid of Messrs. Sutherland, Barry & Co., of New Orleans, Louisiana, offering par and accrued interest to date of delivery for the \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District No. Nine (9) of the parish of Grant. Thereupon, the following ordinance was offered by Dr. Corley and seconded by Mr. Jones. An ordinance providing for the adjournment of the police jury of the parish of Grant to August 16th, 1921, for the deliberation and consideration of the two bids submitted for the purchase of \$570,000 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9) of the parish of Grant.

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Grant, State of Louisiana, that the police jury of the Parish of Grant adjourn to meet at ten (10:00) o'clock a. m. on Tuesday, August 16, 1921, for the consideration and determination of the bids submitted this day for the purchase of \$570,000.00 of road bonds of Road District Number Nine (9), of the parish of Grant.

The vote on this ordinance was as follows:

Yeas:—Randolph, Corley, Bryant, Lemoine, Nugent, Fralick and Jones.

Nays:—None.
