OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS OF THE POLICE JURY OF GRANT PARISH

Colfax, La., April 3, 1922.

The police jury of the parish of Grant met this day in regular session with the following members present: Randolph, Fralick, Nugent, Lemoine, Jones and Bryant.

The minutes were read and approved.

Mr. C. V. Dyson asked for the privilege of using the dipping vat near his place. On motion of W. L. Nugent, seconded by Mr. Bryant, Mr. Dyson was allowed to repair the above mentioned vat and use the same for dipping.

Margurite Suder, deceased, was stricken from the pauper's roll.

M. DeBlanc, deceased, was stricken from the pauper's roll.

On motion of Jones, seconded by Lemoine, S. D. Jones was granted refund of \$7.70 in taxes.

A letter was read from the Highway Commission relative to maintenance of the Jefferson Highway. The secretary was asked to write the Highway Commission fully.

On motion of J. M. Jones, seconded by W. L. Nugent, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the police jury of the parish of Grant, for sums of money borrowed from time to time from the fiscal agent, hereby pledges to the Bank of Colfax as fiscal agent, the taxes levied by the police jury for the general fund of the parish for the year 1922 to the extent of 3 1/2 mills, said taxes to secure payment of any loans made to the parish of Grant by said Bank of Colfax.

On motion of J. C. C. Fralick, seconded by F. E. Lemoine, the president of the police jury was authorized to sign a note with the fiscal agent for the sum of \$12,500.00 for current needs.

Mr. J. H. McNeely asked an appropriation of \$100.00 for protection of the trees on the court house square planted in memory of the boys from Grant who were killed in the great war. The jury, on motion of Lemoine, seconded by Bryant, granted the request.

On motion of Fralick, seconded by Jones, the following petition was read:

To the Hon. President and Members of the Police Jury of Rapides Parish, Gentlemen: You are hereby respectfully petitioned to build and gravel the Claiborn road from the Rapides parish line to the Jefferson Highway. If this is done we will very soon have a graveled road from the Jefferson Highway to Zion through the center of Grant. This road in Grant is now ready for gravel as far north as Dry Prong. Your consideration will be greatly appreciated.

A bill was presented by Mr. L. E. French for the sum of \$50.00 for legal services rendered to him by Provosty and West. The jury declined to act upon the bill, feeling that there is some misunderstanding.

Upon request of Mrs. Isabella Sandifer, Henry Lewis was made her agent in the place of Mr. Bruce, moved away.

Upon petition, Hannah Frederick and Lucinda Smith were placed on the pauper's roll, with T. H. McNeely as agent.

There was no further business and the jury adjourned.

Also for furnishing material and constructing reinforced concrete culverts on said road.
