On motion ordinance No. 1 known as the "game law" was amended by the adoption of ordinance No. 12.

known as the game law: Sec. 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Caldwell in regular session convened, That ordinance No. one, passed by the Police Jury of the Parish of Caldwell, at its regular session on October 3rd, 1892, known as the game law, be and the same is hereby amended and reordained so as to read as follows:

That it shall be unlawful in the Parish of Caldwell, La., to catch, kill or pursue with such intent, any wild buck, doe or fawn, or to have the same in possession, after it has been caught or killed between the 31st day of May and the 2nd day of June of each and every year, under a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars for each offense.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, That this ordinance take effect from and after its adoption.

On motion the following resolution was adopted.

Whereas, under ordinance No. 11, adopted February 5th, 1894, a courthouse was ordered erected on the courthouse square in Columbia, La., and a committee to contract for same was appointed thereunder: And whereas said committee has reported to this body that they have contracted with P. J. Gillen for the building of same, under plans and specifications on file in the office of the Secretary of said committee; and, whereas, after a careful examination of the plans, and specifications and contract for the building of said house, we unqualifiedly approve this action and feel that their efforts should meet with favor from every fair minded citizen. Therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Police Jury in regular session convened, That the contract entered into by and between the building committee, appointed by said ordinance No. 11, adopted February 5th, 1894, and P. J. Gillen, for the building of a courthouse provided for in said ordinance, be and the same is hereby ratified and approved.

On motion the following report of the courthouse committee was read and ordered filed.

COLUMBIA, LA., April 2, 1894. To the Hon'l President and Gentlemen of the Police Jury of Caldwell Parish:

We, your committee appointed at the meeting of your Hon. body on the 5th of February last, to contract for, and erect a courthouse under the provisions of ordinance No. 11, passed by your Hon. body, beg to report as follows: Shortly after being appointed, we proceeded to organize, by electing Hon. S. H. Gilbert Chairman, and J. J. Meredith Secretary; and at the same meeting, motion was made and carried, that the President and Secretary visit the town of Rayville, Richland parish, La., to gain information as to plans, style &c., for a courthouse. Accordingly the committee visited Rayville, and reported to our building committee as to the Rayville courthouse. After considering that portion of your ordinance relative to advertising for bids, and considering that "it would be necessary to advertise for a period of 30 days, in the leading daily newspapers of Louisiana, St. Louis, New Orleans and other leading cities, in order to reach building contractors, or men who would be likely to take such a contract, under the terms of your ordinance, and your ordinance not defining the manner of advertising, we decided, as a matter of economy, to write to the different building companies, which we did and furnished them with a copy of your ordinance providing for the erecting of a courthouse, and they all respectfully declined to accept the contract.

The Chairman and Secretary of your building committee, on their trip to Rayville, accidentally met with Mr. P. J. Gillen of Bessemer, Ala., a building contractor, then en route to some portion of Texas to bid on the contract for a courthouse there, we invited him to visit our town, with a view of bidding on our courthouse, which he cheerfully agreed to do, naming the day in the future, he would meet us; and according to promise, he came, and after submitting his plan, the committee was well pleased with it, and thinking 'twould suit our people, and that 'twas to the best interest of our parish at large, we accepted his bid and entered into contract, with the said Gillen, as per plan, specifications &c., now on file in our office, and in the hands of the Secretary of said building committee.

Trusting our action to date, will meet your approbation and approval, we have the honor to subscribe ourselves, Yours most respectfully, P. J. MEREDITH, Secretary Building Committee.

On motion the sum of \$35.00 was appropriated for the purpose of repairing the

Buckoo bridge on Buckskin road. On motion C. C. Jarrell, W. T. Wials and J. M. Smith be and they are hereby appointed a committee to purchase said lumber, and to receive the work when done. The warrant for said lumber to be paid upon presentation of account signed by said committee.
