McSween, president of said board, hereby give notice that in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in School District No. 13 of the Parish of Caldwell, La., on

Tuesday, August 8, 1911, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers, qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, to vote at said election, the following propositions to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of five mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 13 of the Parish of Caldwell, Louisiana, subject to State taxation, annually, for a period of five years, for the purpose of:

(a) Giving additional aid to public schools.  
(b) Purchasing (or constructing) a public school building, title to which shall vest in the public, or constructing a public school building and purchasing a site therefor, title to which shall vest in the public.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of \$1000, to run not longer than five years from date and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, for the purpose of purchasing (or constructing) a public school building, title to vest in the public; or, constructing a public school building and purchasing a site therefor, title to which shall vest in the public.

For the purpose of said special election, the polling place shall be Liberty School House. And the following commissioners and clerks of election have been appointed, viz: J. Eason, W. H. Bass, J. M. Sherrod, commissioners; G. L. Shipp, clerk. All whom shall serve without compensation. At said election, the polls shall be open from 8 a. m. and close at 5 p. m., and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of Louisiana, applicable thereto.


