## CALDWELL WATCHMAN

### Grayson School House Dedicated

Last Thursday morning the last nail was driven in the new school building at Grayson and the house was pronounced complete.

The people of Grayson and surrounding territory met under the great oak shade trees which adorn the campus at 10 a. m. to dedicate their handsome building to the cause of education and to the children of their community.

Prof. C. S. Richardson, State Inspector of Agricultural Schools, was introduced. Mr. Richardson delivered one of the most eloquent addresses ever heard in this parish. The theme chosen was two criticisms of the public school system as it now exists, viz: "The present course of study and the increased cost of maintenance." He said that the first criticism was just, that the course of study should be amended to meet the requirement of life in a more practical way. He believed that cooking and sewing for the girls and farming and mechanics, including manual training for the boys, should be taught in our public schools. Regarding the increased cost of education, the speaker did not think that this criticism was justifiable, in view of the fact that the people are demanding so much

of the schools and the sharp competition of modern life demands greater preparation by our boys and girls to meet its conflicts. Prof. Richardson expressed himself as very favorably impressed with the school situation at Grayson, complimented its people on their handsome new building and predicted that next year they would be recognized as one of the State Agricultural Schools. At the conclusion of Mr. Richardson's address a magnificent basket dinner was served on tables under the shade trees on the campus. There was plenty of dinner for all—and then some more. In spite of the fact that one of the biggest crowds seen for some time in this parish was present, baskets of dinner were carried back after all were generously served.

Dinner over, Supt. E. H. Turner addressed the audience on the "progress of the schools of the parish," and closed his remarks by officially dedicating the building.

Hon. J. J. Meredith, of Columbia, was next heard. His address was along general educational lines.

The Grayson building is a frame house, two stories high, contains three large class rooms, three cloak rooms, hallway and large auditorium. It is built of the very best lumber, nicely painted outside and hardoiled

inside, brick foundation and metal roof. It is by far the prettiest school building in the parish. It was completed at a cost of \$2500. We congratulate Grayson upon the enterprise of its citizens in making the erection of this handsome structure, and predict for her a great future educationally as well as otherwise.

### Town Taxes.

We are informed that at a meeting of the Town Council held on the 12th inst., a resolution was adopted calling on all property owners who were delinquent in their town taxes to settle the same at once, and in the event they refused to do so, the town marshal, who is the ex-officio tax collector, was instructed to force collection of the same by law. In this connection we do not remember of a single instance heretofore when it has been necessary to enforce payment of any taxes, which speaks remarkably well for the citizenship of our town, and we would regret to see the authorities have to force collection of these taxes by seizure at this time, as they have done so much towards improving our little town.

The town authorities have spent a great deal of money on bridges and streets this year and have made some permanent improvements, which add materially to our town, and we believe every one can say that the money has all been well expended, and from the amount of money they have had to operate with, we consider they have done remarkable well.

We are also informed that the town is now in debt, caused by the failure of some of the property owners to pay their just taxes and that they have no money with which they can continue the good work that has been started by them, and it behooves every delinquent to come forward at once and settle the amount due by him. We know that we have a patriotic citizenship and know that all are willing to do their duty, and we believe that it is because the matter of payment of these taxes have not been brought before them in the proper light.


