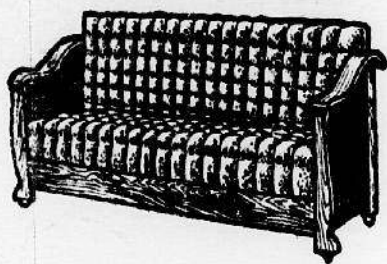

Pursuant to a resolution passed by the Parish Board of School Directors of the parish of Caldwell, La., at its regular session held on the 6th day of July 1912, I, G. T. McSweeney, president of said board, hereby give notice that, in compliance with said resolution, a special election will be held in School District No. 16 of said Caldwell parish, La., on Tuesday, August 13, 1912, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers, qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, to vote at said election, the following propositions, to-wit:

1. To levy a special tax of five mills on the dollar on all property in School District No. 16 of the Parish of Caldwell, La., subject to state taxation, annually, for a period of ten years, for the purpose of:

(a) Giving additional aid to public schools.

(b) Purchasing (or constructing) a public school building, title to which shall vest in the public; or, constructing a public school building and purchasing a site therefor, title to which shall vest in the public.

2. To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000) to run not longer than ten years and to bear interest not exceeding ten per cent per annum, payable annually, for the purpose of purchasing or constructing a public school building, title to which shall vest in the public; or, constructing a public school building and purchasing a site therefor, title to which shall vest in the public.

For the purposes of said election the polling place shall be Valentine school house, and J. W. Horn, J. A. Hudson and J. N. Valentine are appointed commissioners, and W. L. White clerk of election, all of whom shall serve without compensation.

At said special election the polls will open at seven a. m. and close at five p. m., and the election will be conducted in accordance with the laws of Louisiana applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at 10 o'clock a. m. on the 5th day of Oct., 1912, the Parish Board of School Directors will meet at Columbia, La., for the purpose of opening the ballot boxes, examining and canvassing the returns and declaring the results of said election.
