ORDINANCE NO. —


Providing for a special election in ward 6, in the Parish of Caldwell, pursuant to the provisions of Article 291, of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, adopted in 1898, at which special elections shall be submitted to the legally qualified voters and property taxpayers in said ward, who are entitled to vote on the question of levying a special tax of three (3) mills per annum, for a period of two years, and two (2) mills per annum for the subsequent three years, on the assessed valuation of the property in said ward, beginning with the year 1913, for the purpose of building and maintaining public roads and bridges in said wards.

Section 1—Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Caldwell, in regular session convened, That a special election be held in ward six (6) at the regular polling place as now fixed by law, on Tuesday, the 26th day of August, 1913, in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, providing for and regulating such elections, at which election shall be submitted to the legally qualified voters and property taxpayers in said ward who are entitled to vote thereat, under the laws and Constitution of the State of Louisiana, the question of levying a special tax of three (3) mills on the dollar of the valuation of all taxable property in said ward, annually, for a period of two (2) years, beginning with the year 1913, and two (2) mills of the dollar of the valuation of all taxable property in said ward, annually, for a period of three years, beginning with the year 1913, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining public roads in said ward.

Section 2—Be it further ordained, That said special election shall be held under the general election laws of the State of Louisiana, and that the board of supervisors of elections in and for the Parish of Caldwell are hereby requested to give due notice of said election, to appoint commissioners for holding the same, and to make returns of the result of the same, in the manner prescribed by law, to the police jury.

Section 3—Be it further ordained, That the ballots used in said election shall be printed in the following form: "For Special Tax of three mills for two years, and two mills for

three years, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining public roads and bridges in ward six."

"Against the Special tax of three mills for two years, and two mills for three years, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining public roads and bridges in ward six"

Section 4—Be it further ordained, That the commissioners of election appointed to serve at said special election shall receive the ballots of the legally qualified voters and property taxpayers in said ward who are entitled to vote at said special election under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana, and, before depositing same in the ballot box, the said commissioner shall endorse on the ballot, in the presence of the voter, the amount of the assessed value of his property as shown by the last tax rolls filed, a copy of which shall be furnished said commissioner, and said commissioners shall make due returns of the vote cast, and the amount of the assessed value of the property voted "for" and "against" the levying of the said special tax.

Section 5—Be it further ordained, That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed, and that this ordinance take effect from and after its adoption. Adopted this July 7, 1913. H. H. Rogillio, Pres. R. R. Redditt, Clerk.
