First Bale.

Penn of Bellevue plantation, on the East Side, brought to Columbia Wednesday the first bale of cotton raised this year, which weighed 500 pounds and brought 12 3/4 cents on the local market, the bale being purchased by J. D. Yarborough. This is indeed quite a compliment to the ability of Mr. Penn as a farmer, as well as reflecting with much credit on the productiveness of our soil. Mr. Penn has a splendid and large crop, covering many acres, and will probably bring in many other packages of the fleecy staple, running up into the hundreds, during the season.

ORDINANCE NO.—

An ordinance adopted by the Police Jury of the parish of Caldwell, calling and election in Ward Two (2), of said parish, to take the sense of the legally qualified electors and property tax payers in said ward touching the question of voting a five mills tax for ten years, beginning with the year 1913, for the purpose of building, constructing and maintaining public roads in said ward.

Sec. 1.—Whereas, there has been presented to the police jury of the parish of Caldwell a petition signed by a majority of the qualified electors and property tax-payers residing in said ward, therefore

Be it ordained by the police jury of the parish of Caldwell, in regular session convened, That an election be held at the regular established polling place or voting precinct in said ward on Tuesday, the 7th day of October, 1913, to take the sense of the legally qualified electors and property tax payers of said ward, touching the question of whether an annual tax of five mills for ten years, beginning with the year 1913, shall be levied on all property in said ward subject to taxation, for the purpose of building, constructing and maintaining the roads of said ward, and for the further purpose of taking the sense of the voters of said ward as to whether debt shall be incurred and bonds issued to the amount Five Thousand Dollars, to run not longer than ten years, and to bear interest not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable annually, for the aforesaid purpose of building, constructing and maintain the

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public roads in said ward.

Sec. 2.—Be it further ordained, That the following named commissioners and clerks are hereby appointed to hold said election, to-wit: B. E. Erskins, T. J. Lively and D. D. Pool, commissioners; W. A. Davis, clerk.

Sec. 3.—Be it further ordained, That at said election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock a. m., and closed at five o'clock p. m., and that said election shall be conducted in accordance with the general election laws of the State of Louisiana.

Sec. 4.—Be it further ordained, That the police jury of the parish of Caldwell shall meet in the town of Columbia, La., on Thursday, the 9th day of October, 1913, for the purpose of opening the ballot boxes, examining and canvassing the returns, and declaring the result of said election. Adopted September 1, 1913.


The Boosters' have on foot a plan to build a boardway walk from the business part of town to the depot, the funds to be raised by private subscription supplemented by an appropriation.
