Tensas Basin Levee Board Proceedings

Rayville, La., Oct. 9, 1913.

A regular meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Tensas Basin Levee District was held at its domicile in the town of Rayville, La., on Thursday, October 9, 1913.

Present, T. B. Gilbert, Sr., president; C. H. McHenry, W. S. Peck, J. A. Lester, B. E. Blake and Geo. J. Glover, members, and J. W. Summerlin, secretary.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Secretary reported receipts and disbursements and balance on hand for quarter ending Sept. 30, 1913, as follows:

Total receipts and balance...\$194,255.80
Total disbursements for qr... 76,725.90

Bal on hand Oct. 1, 1913...\$117,529.90

Secretary also reported amounts received from the several parishes of the district, account of 5-mill levee taxes for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1913, as follows:

The president presented the written application of Mr. O. C. Freeland to purchase the set of ne section 1, township 21 north, range 4 east, and Lot 5 and the set of se section 18, township 21 north, range 5 east, situated in Morehouse parish, together with the required deposit, in accordance with Act No. 215 of the General Assembly of 1908, and on motion of Mr. McHenry, duly seconded, the president was authorized to proceed with the sale, according to law, and to refer the matter as to character of land, estimate of timber, etc., to Mr. B. Turpin, parish surveyor of Morehouse parish.

Mr. C. L. Berry, attorney, appeared before the board, presented an abstract of title to the e of se section 2, township 12 north, range 9 east, together with the written opinion of Mr. T. R. Hodge, district attorney of the 7th judicial district, ex-officio attorney of this board, as follows, and asked that a quit claim deed be granted by this board to his client:

To the Levee Board: I have examined the abstract and other papers relative to quit claim to e of se section 2, township 12 north, range 6 east, and in my opinion the board has no title or claim on same, and therefore recommend that a quit claim be made to same.

Tobin H. Hodge, Dist. Atty.
Upon motion duly seconded, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, it appearing from an abstract of title presented to this board in open session, showing that the board's title to the e of se section 2, township 12 north, range 6 east, situated in the Parish of Franklin, La., is invalid, and the written opinion being given by Tobin H. Hodge, district attorney of the 7th judicial district, ex-officio attorney of this board, that the said board has no title or claim to said land.

Therefore be it resolved by the board of Commissioners of the Tensas Basin Levee District, in regular session convened, That the president of this board grant and execute the necessary relinquishment and quit claim deed, for and in the name of said board, to said land, to and in favor of the proper owner thereof, for the reason of invalid title.

Mr. McHenry presented the following resolution, which on motion duly seconded, was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, T. B. Gilbert, Sr., president of this board, in the interim of meetings, did on behalf of said board, acting under his general authority as president, file an answer in the Federal District Court to the rule of the Tensas Delta Land Co. Ltd., to show cause why the suit of the Board of Commissioners of the Tensas Basin Levee District vs. Tensas Delta Land Co. should not be dismissed, joining the said Land Co. in its prayer.

Therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners of the Tensas Basin Levee District, in regular session convened, That the said action of T. B. Gilbert, Sr., president, be and the same is hereby ratified and approved, and further, that this board does hereby specially authorize the said T. B. Gilbert, Sr., president, to take any further action on behalf of this board that may be found necessary, for the dismissal of the said suit of this board vs. Tensas Delta Land Co. Ltd.
