Police Jury Proceedings

And the Secretary of the Police Jury shall have prepared for use at said special election all necessary ballot boxes, tally sheets, lists of voters, assessed valuation of property and compiled statement of votes in number and amount.

Sec. 4. That the polling places for said election shall be Columbia, Grayson and Clarks precincts, that for the Columbia precinct the following commissioners are appointed: P. H. Me-com, J. R. Brown and J. E. Humphries and for said precinct C. R. Ferrand is hereby appointed clerk of said election for Grayson precinct; W. R. Broadway, Dr. O. A. Biggs and A. M. Grayson are hereby appointed commissioners and J. A. Warner clerk of said election; for Clarks precinct, H. M. Snider, J. W. Clarkson and J. W. Jackson are hereby appointed commissioners and E. E. Tarver clerk of said election; and all of the clerks and commissioners herein above appointed shall serve without compensation.

Sec. 5. The President of this body is hereby directed to give notice of the special election herein ordered by his proclamation, to be published according to law, and in his said proclamation he shall announce that the Police Jury will meet at the office of the Secretary at Columbia, La., on the 23d day of July, 1914, at the hour of 11 o'clock and in open session proceed in manner and form as required by law to examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of said election.

Sec. 6. That this ordinance take effect from and after its adoption.
