

**ORDINANCE**

Be it remembered that at a regular meeting of the Police Jury of the Parish of Caldwell in the State of Louisiana held on the 5th day of January, A. D. 1916, at its regular place of meeting, at Columbia, La., at 11 o'clock a m, there being then and there present the following members of said Police Jury:

J M Bennett, T F James, P F Claunch, H H Rogillio, J W King, C R Benson, J W James, J J Harris, J L Johnson, and A H Humphries.

Absent: None.

At which meeting certain proceedings were had, among which were the following:

J J Harris presented a certain ordinance, and moved its adoption, and whereupon J W James seconded said motion to adopt said ordinance, and said motion being then and there put to a vote of the "Ayes" and "Nays" and the roll being called, the following members voting aye: J M Bennett, T F James, H H Rogillio, C R Benson, J W James, J J Harris, and J L Johnson, 7 in number. The following voted nay: P F Claunch, J W King, and A H Humphries, 3 in number.

The vote of the ayes and nays being thus taken showing the clear legal majority required by law, said ordinance was adopted, which ordinance is in the words and figures, to-wit:

An ordinance providing for the issuance of road bonds of the Parish of Caldwell, in the State of Louisiana, in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15000) pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 4 of Article 281 of the Constitution of said State and providing for the payment of the Principal and interest thereof.

Whereas, the parish of Caldwell is now engaged in constructing highways for said parish and in connection therewith has incurred indebtedness and has entered into contracts for road making materials, the aggregate of which will be at least the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15000) and,

Whereas, the Police Jury of said Parish has ascertained and determined that the amount of the annual statutory and ordinary charges of the Parish which it will be necessary for it hereafter to pay out of the proceeds of the ten mill tax authorized by the Constitution, after deducting the three mill school tax, in addition to all prior special appropriations dedications do not exceed the annual sum of thirteen thousand and five hundred dollars (\$13,500) and it appears that the proceeds of the said ten mill tax for the current year, 1915, after deducting the three (3) mill school tax, will exceed the amount required for all statutory and ordinary charges of said Parish, and for all prior special and specific appropriations by at least the sum of twenty-two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250), being an amount that can be provided for our of the levy and collection of a one mill tax; and

Whereas the budget of expenditures of the said Parish for the 1915 was duly adopted at the regular meeting of the Police Jury on September 23, A D 1915, and the surplus or residue of the ten

mill tax authorized to be levied and collected for the year 1915-1916, pursuant to article 232 of the Constitution, as herebefore ascertained and determined by this Police Jury will be the sum of not less than two thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250); which is now properly available for dedication and appropriation for any lawful purpose;

Now therefore, be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of Caldwell, in the State of Louisiana,

Section 1. That bonds of the Parish of Caldwell, Louisiana, to the amount of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) be issued. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of July and January of each year, except the first coupon which shall be for one year's interest and payable January 1, A. D. 1917; hereafter the first day of January, A. D. 1918, being the anniversary of the date of the issue of said bonds, both inclusive and annually on the first day of January, in each of the years 1919, 1920, 1921, 1922, 1923, 1924, and 1925, both inclusive.

Section 2. That said bonds and the interest coupons thereon shall be provided with the necessary variations to show the different numbers and maturities, shall be in substantially the following forms:

Know all men by these presents that the Parish of Caldwell in the State of Louisiana, acknowledged itself to be indebted and for value received hereby promises to pay bearer the sum of FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS on the first day of January, A. D. 19---, together with interest thereon from the date hereof until paid at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of July and of January in each year, (provided, however, that the first interest coupon shall be payable January 1, A. D. 1917, for one year's interest), upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto annexed as they severally become due. Both principal and interest of this bond are payable in lawful money of the United States, at the Banking House of the First National Bank, in the City of Chicago Illinois.

This Bond is one of a series of bonds of like date, tenor and terms, except maturity, issued by said Parish for the purpose of constructing permanent roads under and pursuant to and in full conformity with all of the requirements of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, including Article 281 thereof and the laws of the State of Louisiana.

It is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done precedent to and in the issuance of this bond have been done, happened and been performed in regular and due time, form and manner as required by law, and that the total indebtedness of said Parish, including this bond, does not exceed any constitutional

or statutory limitations; that the installments of interest and of the principal of this bond are respectively payable from the avails of the residue of the ten mill tax authorized by said Constitution, levied and to be levied in the years 1916 to 1925 inclusive, in sufficient amounts to promptly pay the same as they respectively fall due; and it is hereby certified, recited and declared that it has been duly ascertained that the said residue is and will continue to be sufficient to pay the installments of interest on this bond as the same become due and payable, and the principal hereof at maturity, together with the principal and interest of all other bonds of this issue; and that provision has been and will continue to be made in due form and manner, setting aside, appropriating and dedicating a sufficient part of the avails of the residue of the said ten (10) mill tax, for the payment of the principal and interest of this bond and of the other bonds of this issue.

In testimony whereof the Parish of Caldwell in the State of Louisiana, by its Police Jury, has caused its corporate seal to be hereon affixed and this bond to be signed by the President, attested by the Clerk of the said Police Jury and the coupons hereto annexed to be executed with the respective signatures of said officers, and this bond to be dated the first day of January, A. D. 1916.

On the first day of (July) (January), A. D. 19---, the Parish of Caldwell, State of Louisiana, promises to pay Bearer Twelve Dollars and Fifty Cents at the Banking House of the First National Bank, in the City of Chicago, Illinois, for interest then due on its Road Bond dated January 1, A. E. 1916, No. ---.

The coupons attached to said bonds shall each be for the sum of Twelve Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$12.50), except coupon number 1 which shall be for one year's interest, and payable January 1, A. D. 1917, to-wit: the sum of Twenty-Five Dollars (25.00).

Section 3. That for the purpose of paying the installments of interest and principal of said bonds as the same shall become payable, there shall be annually levied and collected in each of the years 1916 to 1925, both inclusive, the full ten (10) mill tax authorized by Article 232 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana, and there is hereby set aside, appropriated and dedicated out of the taxes to be collected in the years 1916 to 1925 inclusive, one mill of said full ten (10) mill tax, authorized to be levied by the Constitution, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to pay the installments of interest and principal of said bonds as the same, respectively, become due and payable as provided by his ordinance; the Police Jury of said Parish having investigated and found that the statutory charges of said parish, after deducting three (3) mill school tax and all prior dedications of any portion of the said ten (10) mill tax can be paid and met from the remainder of the said tax which is not hereby appropriated and dedicated, and after making provision for the payment of all statutory and ordinary charges the three (3) mill school tax and prior dedications, the said residue of the said ten (10) mill tax remain and is available and sufficient for said purpose. The appropriation and dedication of the avails of the residue of the said ten (10) mill tax shall continue and be in force for the term of ten (10) years from the date of the adoption of this ordinance

and the tax provided for hereby shall be set aside and used only for the purpose of paying the installments of interest and principal of the bonds authorized to be issued by this ordinance.

That the ten (10) mill tax to be collected in the years 1916 to 1925, both inclusive, is hereby appropriated and dedicated as follows:

Sec. 4. It is further ordained and ordered that said bonds when executed, as above provided, shall forthwith be delivered at their par value to Powell, Gard & Co., the purchasers of said bonds.

Sec. 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, as well as Ordinance 72 1/2, approved Nov. 1 A. D. 1915, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
