PROCLAMATION

Whereas, the eradication of the cattle tick in the tick infested districts of Louisiana would be of vast economic benefit to the State; and

Whereas, the progress of the work is being impeded to a great extent through indifference on the part of the people due, presumably, to a lack of knowledge as to the importance of the work and of the necessary methods to be employed; and

Whereas, it is desirable that the boys and girls of the State should receive instruction with reference to the matter, to the end that interest may be aroused among them as well as among the people of the several communities.

Now, therefore, I, Luther E. Hall, Governor of the State of Louisiana, do hereby issue this my proclamation designating Thursday, the 20th day of April, 1916, as "Tick Eradication Day", and request and direct that all teachers in the public schools of the State devote the hour between 2 p. m. and 3 p. m. of said day to the instruction of their pupils as to the importance of the eradication of the cattle tick, and the methods by which the work can be successfully conducted, special cards of instruction to be forwarded to them by the Superintendent of Public Education. I request furthermore that the patrons of the schools and all others in the several communities assemble at the school houses and cooperate with the teachers and children in an effort to stimulate interest in the inauguration of an energetic campaign throughout the State for the eradication of the tick. I request also the press of the State to lend its great aid and influence to the movement by publication of articles bearing upon the subject matter, and in every way possible.
