THE LEVEES AND REVETMENT WORK.

We have received the report of the Chief of Engineers of the U. S. Army for 1895. This report consists of seven large volumes, handsomely bound, and covers all the engineering projects of the country under the direction and management of the Army Engineers. It contains, in detail, all the reports, maps, profiles and specifications of all the work in progress and is full of valuable information. To give a faint idea of the extent and scope of this vast work we copy a few items from the report of Capt. Townsend as affecting our own little community and territory, which is only as to a drop in the bucket.

"During the past month the work of revetting the bank above Lake Providence has been begun. The primary object of this improvement has been the protection of the levee across the foot of the lake, whose destruction is being threatened by a rapidly caving bank. This caving would also ultimately have destroyed the town of Lake Providence, and the work will form a valuable portion of any project which may hereafter be adopted for the permanent improvement of Lake Providence reach. Four thousand seven hundred and eighty feet of bank was revetted. The average cost per linear foot was \$30.41, making a total of \$145,350.80."

This report covers the work done during the winter of 1894-95. An equal or greater amount was done during the winter of 1895-96, which will appear in the next annual report. Turning then to the report for levees of the middle Tensas district, extending from the La., Arkansas line down to Bedfords, a distance of 87 miles, under local charge of Assistant Engineer W. S. Brown, we find tabulated statements showing the following facts.

In 1882 this entire line contained 3,181,000 cubic yards. From 1882 to 1894 there was erected and added to this line under contracts of the Government 3,128,408 cubic yards. In 1894-95, there was added in enlargement and banquette 708,210 yards, and the work of the present season, now within a few days of completion, covers 991,000 yards.

This shows that the Government has put up in this district, covering only 87 miles of river front, 4,897,618 yards of levees to date. And during all this time the Levee Board has not been idle. It has also done a great amount of work, putting our levee line in quite as good if not in better condition than any in the country. By survey and report of the assistant engineer this 87 miles of levee contained, at the close of the work in 1895, 9,357,861 cubic yards. Add the work of the present season and it will contain, when the contracts are completed, 10,348,851 cubic yards. Compare this to the condition existing in 1882 and it will be seen that there has been an increase of 70 per cent in the efficiency and strength of the levees. The cost of this work by the Government, including amounts expended during the seasons of high water, is approximately \$970,000. These facts and figures speak for themselves, and when it is considered how small a portion of this great country is covered by what we have shown, some few may be able to form some idea of the extent, scope and cost of the engineering projects of these United States.

With the above conditions existing, news now comes that the River and Harbor bill reported by the committee on Saturday last, passed the House on Monday by an overwhelming majority. This bill provides for the expenditure of \$625,000 for the present year on the Mississippi river, and an additional appropriation of \$8,375,000 for future contracts.

The Baton Rouge Capital Item says that on Wednesday morning last, about the time the citizens began stirring it was real laughable to see them trying to dodge the yellow flags that were stuck up all over the city. They soon found out that it was an April fool joke.

What Will You Do With The Convicts?

One of the amendments submitted to the voters of this State to be acted upon at the general election prohibits the leasing of the convicts of the Louisiana State Penitentiary after the expiration of the present lease. If this be adopted the State will have thrown upon its hand 1200 or more State prisoners, and unless provision be made in time for their maintenance more or less hardships will most assuredly fall to the lot of these unfortunate people. The prison, built some 60 years ago, is no longer adapted to their confinement unless every advanced idea of prison sanitation be lost sight of, and even then there are not anything like enough cells to accommodate the large and steadily increasing number of criminals being constantly sent into penal servitude. There are but two buildings fitted with cells (some 250 each) and one of these is in a most dilapidated condition. The main or front cell room is in first-class order, in so far as locks, floors and masonry are concerned, but woefully deficient in sanitary requirements. The Board of Control has had repairs made to an extent attainable with the small amount of money at its command, but as the law only permits that body to make repairs, nothing has been done to preserve unoccupied portions of the prison. What should be done within the next six years, which we believe covers the life of the lease, is to gradually restore the property to its original condition, build new cell rooms more in accordance with the spirit of the age in which we live and with the dictates of humanity—in fact to remodel the entire system. To do this will require a considerable outlay of money, a large proportion of the yearly rental, which can only be utilized after legislative authority has been granted.

Under the system extant, that of requiring the lessees to pay the sum of \$50,000 in advance, it is absolutely beyond the resources of the Board to have even slight repairs made unless the lessees feel inclined to advance sums of money and await its return at the next settlement with the State.

The legislature should at its very next meeting enact such legislation as may be necessary to meet contingencies at the expiration of the lease or the State may one day find itself in a most awkward predicament—with 1200 or 1500 convicts on its hands and no place to house or lock them up.—Baton Rouge Truth.
