

speaking of places where the regular tickets alone are sold. There are hundreds more of them. I am speaking of those places where you can go in and play 4-11-44. Of these there are 108. Do you people know how many there are in the eighth and ninth wards? Do you know how many there are among you? Over twenty in the seventh, eighth and ninth wards. (A voice, "And they are well patronized.") I am going to talk about their patronage directly.

My friends, I do not know, and no man knows except the lottery people, and they won't tell, how much money they make out of this policy game. I was informed by a lottery stockholder, at a time not suspicious, before this question arose a year or two ago, that the average receipts of these policy shops were \$30 a day. Now, 108 shops at \$30 a day makes over \$6,000 a day, or \$2,000,000 a year.

Now, where does the money come from? Don't you know where that money comes from? Can not every man within the sound of my voice turn around the corner and

POINT TO A DESOLATE HOME made so by the daily drawing. I say, go and stand at the door of one of these infamous policy shops, as I have done; note the people who go in, and you will see the slatternly woman, the barefooted child, the poor and the deluded, the workman going to and from his work. You do not see anybody going there who has got any judgment or who understands the thieving nature of the game that he is playing.

Why, my friends, I have got no time to calculate the percentages, but they vary from sixteen, which is the lowest, up to 80 odd per cent against the player, and all that the people get back from this thieving daily drawing is the small percentage of prize money that is paid back, because the gamblers' percentage is bound to win in the long run. Let us say that they treat this daily drawing upon the same basis and pay half of the money back, there is \$1,000,000 gone out of the pockets of the ignorant, the poor and the deluded of the city of New Orleans; and, my friends, let me tell you that every dollar that goes into the maw of the lottery is lost to the people of this city. That brings me face to face with this proposition: How can the laboring men support the lottery? How can they see it eat the heart out of themselves, their mothers, their sisters, their brothers, devouring their substance? How can any man who has got anything to sell be in favor of the lottery? How can the butcher, the baker, the corner groceryman, the seller of clothes, shoes, or anything that the people buy be in favor of the lottery? Don't all these people who are engaged in trade know that every dollar which goes into the lottery's maw is a dollar lost to honest trade?

To paraphrase what Sir John Culpepper said to Long Parliament about the monopolies of his day, we can say of these policy shops "that are a nest of wasps, a swarm of vermin which have overrept this city. They sit in our cup; they dip in our dish; they sip by our fire. They lighten the market basket and shave off their share of the groceries. They make thieves of our servants, embezzlers of our clerks, and gamblers of our wives and children. These are the leeches that have sucked the commonwealth so hard that it is almost hec-tical."

How, I say, can any man or set of men, Democratic or Republican, white or colored, undertake to support an institution that proposes to

MAINTAIN AN INEQUITY of this sort, a thieving, dishonest gambling game among a people like the people of the city of New Orleans?

Now, my friends, those are briefly my reasons for opposing the lottery. I do not think that I have talked any sentiment to you. I have put upon plain practical grounds that appeal to the common sense and the judgment of everybody, rich and poor, high and low, men of all classes and men of all character.

I say that the Louisiana Lottery Company and this Morris proposition is opposed to the best interests of this State, opposed to the manhood of the State, opposed to the political purity of the State, opposed to the interests of the working people, opposed to the interests of the merchant, opposed to the interest of the lawyer, the doctor and everybody else, because it tends to drain your pockets and to debauch your people; and if these are not sufficient reasons for opposing it, then my friends, I don't know what sufficient reasons for a man's political actions can be.

THE PROGRESSIVE LEAGUE OF LOUISIANA New Orleans, November 12, 1891.

Dr. John Kelly, Winnfield, La.: Dear Sir—Our friend, Mr. A. W. Faulkner, of Columbia, has suggested that you would be likely to assist us in organizing a Branch of our League in your parish; and I write to ask your advice and co-operation.

The Antis are working hard all over the State, and if we are to hold our own, we must do likewise. Our plan is, as soon as the organization is complete throughout the State, to call a convention or conference (say next spring) of representative men from every part of the State and let them decide upon a plan of campaign, and take charge of same. We intend to submit the lottery amendment to the Democratic State Convention, and if it is endorsed there, the Antis will have to support it at the general election or else bolt the party, which their leaders at least cannot afford to do. As matters stand now, after conceding to the Antis every doubtful parish, we think we are sure of nearly two-thirds majority in the Democratic Convention. However, we are determined to make the fight in every parish in the State where our friends can make a showing which will entitle us to have confidence in their success, and we will help them in their local affairs at the same time. We want to know who our friends are everywhere, and how far we may rely upon them.

If you will be kind enough to suggest to us one or two leading men from each ward in your parish, who are friendly to our movement, we will try and interest them in organizing a Parish League. We should much prefer, however, to have you take the lead in the matter, and let us rely on you to see the different ward leaders or else to send some trusted friend to see them, and we will bear the expenses.
