## A Grand Tournament.

The first of May, May Day, or Labor Day, as it is called in some of the States where it is a *Dies Non*, will be celebrated in Opelousas on a grand scale; first there will be a grand horse tournament, a brilliant and scenic page in the history of Romance and Chivalry, the scene being laid beneath the walls of Granada, where Don Quixote, the morose King of Spain, is contending in a life and death struggle with Ferdinand and the Iberian of Castile for supremacy in the Iberian peninsula. As was the custom in the days of chivalry, a grand tournament was held in honor of Christoval Colon, who had returned from his voyage of discovery, to which Don Quixote was invited to participate with his chief warriors. This is of course an anachronism, but intentional in order to secure the color effects of the brilliant Spanish costumes, the gorgeous apparel of the Moors, and the fantastic garb of the Indians whom Columbus has brought over. There will be six prizes, the first being a pair of silver spurs, besides the honor of crowning the Queen of Love and Beauty, the six next best will select the Maids of Honor. The coronation will take place at night, amid bonfires and pyrotechnic displays together with a grand bicycle parade (lantern) and tournaments, the winner crowning the Queen of the Mystic Wheel and the six best her Maids of Honor. A grand ball will follow on a platform laid for the occasion. The Royal couples and their suite, together with the victorious knights, will open the dance in a Royal Minuet, when the platform will be thrown open to the general public. ## A Sad Case.

On last Saturday a little waif, left here by the fallen women in their hasty flight from here, was rescued from the hands of two negro women in whose charge the child had been left until its unfortunate parents could find a place of abode. No one seemed to know of the child's presence in our community until a colored girl reported the matter to Mrs. Raymond Breau last Saturday, adding that the child was being whipped and cruelly treated by the brutal wenches. That evening Mr. Charles Thibodeau and Mr. Raymond Breau rode out to where the child was reported to be, but found the house vacant. A search of the neighborhood discovered the child at the house of Napoleon McBride, a neighbor, and it was learned that the women who had the child in charge were absent from home that evening. The waif, who said he was five years old, was interrogated, and the clear statement he made convinced us that the story of his ill-treatment was only too true. He said that not only did the brutes unmercifully whip him, but that often when he was hungry he had to appeal to the charity of McBride, the neighbor, for something to eat, appeals which were never made in vain. No amount of persuasion could induce the little fellow to come without Kitty's consent, crying and saying that Kitty would "beat" him if he came away. It was evident that he was in great fear of Kitty (Kitty is the woman who had him in charge), and as that plug-ugly chunk of midnight was not at home, the child had to be left there until her return. That night Dr. I. E. Shute, James J. Lewis and Raymond Breau returned to the house and got the child, who was taken in charge by Mrs. Breau.

Upon undressing the little fellow to wash him a slight to make a stout heart black met the eyes. There, upon the back of the poor innocent orphan, were great red stripes, swollen and hard, and in some places the skin had been lacerated and a scab had formed! The child explained that Kitty, the negress, took his clothes off to whip him; and would stick pins in his hands! Can there be anything more revolting? Can a punishment so severe be inflicted on such a human brute?

On Monday an affidavit was made before Judge Simon against the woman Kitty, and she was placed under \$100 bond to appear before the district court. But this is not the punishment she deserves, and there are but few communities in which she would have gotten off that light.

## ORDINANCES

—OF THE—

## POLICE JURY OF THE PARISH OF ST. LANDRY,

ADOPTED MARCH 2, 1897.

## AN ORDINANCE.

Relative to Establishing, Working and Policing Public Roads.

### What Are Public Roads.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Landry, That all roads already laid out, and adopted by the Police Jury, or which shall be laid out as provided for in section 4 of this ordinance, shall be deemed public roads, and shall not be closed, obstructed or changed, without the consent and approval of the Police Jury. That all damages assessed by a jury of freeholders to any individual through whose land the said road may run, shall be deemed a parish charge and paid out of the funds thereof, on the usual warrant; provided, that nothing in this or the following section shall be construed as to give a right to any individual to claim damages for the laying out of a road along any navigable stream according to the former customs existing in this State, or to claim damages for any change made in an existing road, when such change is made at the instance, or for the use and benefit, or with the consent, of such individual; and provided further, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed as to affect in any manner the rights of individuals to any batture or alluvion already formed, or which may be formed, on the front of any tract of land which lies on any navigable river or watercourse, nor to prevent any owner of the soil on which the public road shall pass to resume the use and possession of such soil when it shall have been abandoned by the public, or shall have been transferred elsewhere with the consent of the proper authority.

### Roads, How Made.

SECTION 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That all public roads shall be not less than 35 feet wide.

When road-overscers shall deem it necessary or expedient to make or repair causeways on said roads, such causeways shall be not less than 14 feet wide at the crown or top. The earth necessary to raise or cover such causeways shall be taken from each side thereof in such manner as to effect the proper drainage of the same. Road overseers are hereby directed to keep a space of 16 feet in width along the center of the highways committed to their charge free from all stumps and roots. All bridges hereafter directed to be built shall be not less than 14 feet wide and provided with substantial railings where the stream or ditch to be crossed is more than 3 feet deep. It is hereby made the duty of road overseers to see that all public roads, bridges and causeways committed to their care shall be kept smooth, safe and in good repair. The material used in the construction or repair of all bridges or causeways shall be as durable as can be procured, and of sufficient size and strength to answer the purpose for which it is used.

### Roads, How Petitioned For.

SECTION 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That when it is intended to apply to the Police Jury to have a new road opened, or an existing road changed in whole or in part, notice in writing of such intention shall be filed with the clerk of said jury, and posted up at the court house, and at one or more of the most public places in each road district through which such intended road is to run, or in which such intended alteration is to be made, at least thirty days previous to the same being taken into consideration by the Police Jury, who may dispense with these prerequisites whenever they may deem it necessary.

### Roads, How Laid Out.

SECTION 4. Be it further ordained, etc., That all roads to be hereafter opened and made, and all changes in whole or in part of any existing road, shall be laid out by a jury of freeholders consisting of not less than 3 inhabitants of the parish, to be appointed for that purpose by the Police Jury. The person first named in the order or resolution appointing a jury of freeholders shall be bound to notify the other persons therein named of their appointment and the time and place of meeting to discharge the duties imposed upon them; and it shall be the duty of said jury of freeholders to give notice of the time and place of their meeting to the proprietors and tenants through whose land a road is proposed to be laid out or changed, if such proprietors reside in the parish, and if not, then to their agents therein, if any is known; to trace and lay out the road ordered to be laid out or changed, to the greatest ease and advantage of the inhabitants, and as little as may be, to the prejudice of inclosures, which laying out and such damages as any private person shall sustain, shall be done and ascertained by them, the jury of freeholders, on oath, which oath shall run in these words:

"I, A. B., do solemnly swear that I will assess damages and lay out the road now directed to be laid out by the Police Jury of the Parish of St. Landry, to the greatest ease and advantage of the inhabitants and with as little prejudice to inclosures as may be, without favor or affection, malice or hatred, and to the best of my skill and ability; so help me God."

### Private Ditches, How To Keep Up.

SECTION 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That when, with the consent of the overseer of the road in any district, a ditch or drain shall be widened or made across any public road by any person for the service or benefit of his land, every such ditch or drain, with the necessary bridges over the same, shall, under the supervision of the overseer of the road, be made, and constantly kept and maintained in good order, convenient and safe, by the proprietors or tenants of the land for the use or benefit of whom any such ditch or drain may have been made, or widened, and every such proprietor or tenant failing or neglecting to comply herewith, shall, for every such failure or neglect, forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars; and should the necessary repairs to any such ditch, drain or bridge not be done by the persons herein bound to do the same, and that within twenty-four hours after the same shall have become necessary, or the overseer of roads shall have required such repairs to be done, then the said necessary repairs shall be done by the said overseer of the roads, at the cost of the proprietor or tenant so refusing or neglecting, which cost the said proprietor or tenant shall be bound to pay on demand.

### Changes In Roads, How Made.

SECTION 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That the person at whose request or for whose use or benefit a new road is laid out, or a change is directed to be made in existing road, shall be bound to pay all the expenses of such change, and also be bound without delay to put the part so changed in good order, with the necessary bridges, causeways,
