THE ELECTION.

The municipal election last Monday was perhaps the closest ever held in the town of Opelousas. It was a fight from the time the poll had the best of it.

The result was a partial victory for both sides. The Independents elected the Mayor, Marshal and two Aldermen, and the Democrats four Aldermen. The seventh Aldermen, Mr. Sandoz, was on both tickets. This gives the Democrats control of the Board, and at the same time of the immense patronage to be given out.
