The cotton people are divided in opinion, some advising the planter to sell now, while others are hopeful of better prices. The latter advice (to hold) seems to emanate from more honest, sounder sources.

Church Building Fund Benefit.

Did Not Heed Warning.
On November 22d Mr. F. Charleville, the well-known expert, published an article in the Clarion, warning the cotton farmers that owing to the rainy season they should take extra care to keep their cotton in dry places and on high skirts, as damaged cotton was very unproductive.

It now appears that few farmers heeded his "bleeding advice."

An examination of the cotton yards show that there is considerable water damage of cotton, and we feel sure that they all regret not having heeded Mr. Charleville's advice.

We refer to this matter owing to the prevailing bad weather, in hope that our farmers who still have cotton on hand may yet profit by the advice of one who knows whereof he speaks.

Young Girl Drowns Herself.
Lou Ella Jennings, aged 17 years, committed suicide by drowning in the bayou Courtabeau, near her home, on Monday, January 2d.

The young girl jumped into the stream in the morning, and the body was recovered the same day.

That morning she wrote a five-page letter to her little sister Eola, declaring her resolution to commit suicide. In the letter she said that she had endeavored to procure morphine, but being unable to do so, would resort to drowning.

The letter is written in a rambling way clearly indicating an unbalanced mind, a brain fevered with brooding over one subject and strained to a degree where the mental cords could no longer stand the tension.

She tells her little sister that she is tired, tired of life, protesting in one line that she loves no one, and in the next declaring that she

knows the "old folks" would never consent to her marriage to the only man she had ever or ever would love.

She tells little Eola to look for her body where her bonnet is found—this she repeats several times.

The unfortunate girl is the daughter of Mr. Frank Jennings, a prosperous and prominent farmer of that section.

School Board Proceedings.
Opelousas, January 2, 1905.

The School Board met pursuant to call. Present: Dr. W. H. Ray, President; C. J. Thompson, Dr. R. M. Little, Dr. J. C. Gaudin, Dr. J. Vidrine, J. L. Gibson, Dr. H. S. Joseph, P. L. Fontenot, Absent: D. H. Bernard, Dr. H. Kilpatrick, A. Deville, Dr. Lazarus, C. M. Richards.

On motion of Mr. Fontenot, the minutes of the last meeting were adopted. Superintendent Thompson then read his quarterly report to the Board, which, on motion of Dr. Joseph, was received, with the request that the Board give consideration to such parts of the report as contained special recommendations.

On motion of Mr. Fontenot, the agreement entered into with the Peoples State Bank, by President Ray and Supt. Thompson, with reference to the payment of interest on overdrafts, was confirmed.

The following bills were approved: H. Bodenmiller, printing, etc. \$13.45; Miss J. Callison, sundries, 1.40; C. J. Thompson, sundry supplies, etc. 5.90; " " " " 9.45; " " " " 5.15; Washington Lumber Co. 21.18.

On motion of Dr. Little, it was resolved, that the bill of W. M. Prescott, Assessor, be referred to the attorney of this Board, and if the same be pronounced by him correct and legal, that it be paid, and that the President be authorized to issue a warrant for the same.

On motion of Dr. Daly, it was resolved, that the Superintendent be authorized to fill, with the assistance of the members of the 1st ward, the vacancy in the St. Landry High School, with a kindergarten teacher.

On motion of Dr. Little, the parish treasurer, was authorized to rent all school lands for not less than \$1 per acre. On motion of Dr. Little, the Landry school was closed for the rest of the season.

On motion of Mr. P. L. Fontenot, the following teachers were appointed: Leandre Vidrine school—Miss C. Tate; J. J. Landreneau school—Miss L. Letas; school of Mr. Fontenot, the 2d ward branch at a rental of one-third of the cotton and one-fourth of the corn, to be produced during the year; said branch to be disturbed during said year.

On motion of Mr. Fontenot, Prosper Johnson, E. Miller and J. P. L. Fontenot, were appointed trustees to the Nezapique school.

On motion of Mr. Fontenot, the salary of Miss Beattie Tatman was increased \$10 per month.

On motion of Dr. Little, the employment of another teacher for the Eau Claire school was authorized at a salary of \$45 per month.

On motion of Dr. Ray, the following teachers were appointed: Pitreville school—Miss M. Carter; Lezer school—Miss F. Sittig.

On motion of Dr. Daly, Miss Miriam Crews was appointed as teacher at the Eau Claire school.

On motion of Mr. Vidrine, Mrs. Geo. Vidrine was appointed as teacher at the Andrepont school.

On motion of Mr. Guilbeau, the Devalcourt school was made a Grammar school, and Miss Noemi Richard appointed teacher of the same.

On motion of Dr. Joseph, Mrs. Dr. Theo. Little was appointed principal of the Morrow school, with Miss Dottie Nicholson as assistant teacher.

On motion of Dr. Joseph, Miss Kibbie Whaley was appointed assistant teacher at Melville school at a salary of \$40 per month.

On motion of Dr. Little, Mr. J. D. Hagwood was appointed teacher of the Deshotels school.

On motion of Dr. Ray, Miss K. Reeves was appointed teacher at the L'Anse-aux-Vaches school.

On motion of Dr. Daly, the Port Barre school was authorized to be opened, with Miss J. Callison as principal, and Mrs. J. Hargroder as assistant; salary of the assistant to be \$20 per month.

On motion of Dr. Little, the thanks of the Board were tendered the Police Jury for its liberality in increasing the appropriation for schools from eight to ten thousand dollars.

On motion of Dr. Joseph, it was resolved, that the school Board sell the property at Melville, now occupied as a Grammar school. The proceeds to be applied to the building fund for educational purposes when the town of Melville has voted a five mill tax for ten years for the erection of such building.

AN ORDINANCE.
To fix the dates of the beginning and ending of the closed season for deer, and to appoint game wardens, pursuant to Act No. 126 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved July 5th, 1904.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Police Jury of the parish of St. Landry, in regular session convened, that, pursuant to the provisions of section three of Act No. 126 of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, approved July 5th, 1904, the closed season for hunting or killing deer, shall begin on the first day of the month of February, and end on the last day of the month of August of each year.

Section 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That, Thos. A. Cooke of 1st ward; T. C. Jordan and A. D. Prejan of 2d ward; Emanuel and Maxene Chapman of 3d ward; B. Smith of 4th ward; L. A. Deshotels, Gilbert Stagg and J. M. Roberts of 5th ward; E. H. Wolf of 6th ward; Armand and Maxene Chapman of 7th ward; Mayo Miller and Berler Landry of 8th ward, be and they are hereby appointed game wardens for this parish with all the duties required of such officers by the act aforesaid.

Section 3. Be it further ordained, etc., that the ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.
