LAPLEUR CONVICTED

On Second Trial for Slaying Ville Platte Officer.

The three weeks' jury term of court comes to an end today. It has not been a very successful one, if successful is counted by the number of convictions.

Monday young Henry Lafleur was placed on trial for the second time this term, a mistrial having resulted on the first. Tuesday night at a late hour the jury brought in a verdict of guilty of manslaughter.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE POLICE JURY.

Motion by Mr. Stelly—That a committee of three be appointed by the Chair to confer with Mr. E. B. Dubinsson, Parish Attorney, for the purpose of drafting a suitable ordinance, or resolution providing for the setting aside of necessary funds for the construction of a steel bridge across Bayou Courtableau at Port Barre, for public use.

Motion by Mr. Stelly—That the report of committee appointed to let contracts for building bridge over Bayou Kenison, be received and accepted, committee discharged, and the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars be credited to Mr. R. Bertrand, for public use of the 5th ward funds. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Guilloirey—That the President and Clerk of this Body be authorized to issue a warrant of fifteen thousand dollars against the budget appropriation of 1907, for public schools, and that said warrant be made payable to Mr. A. L. Stagg, Parish Treasurer, for public school purposes. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Savant—That the report of R. P. Savant, road inspector of the 5th ward, on the building of a bridge on road from Bayou Boeuf to Morrow, be received and accepted, committee discharged, and the sum of thirty dollars ordered paid to Mr. J. E. Roberts, out of the 5th ward funds. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Muller—That the report of committee appointed to have a drainage through the properties of Leon Haas and others, drain public road, be received and accepted, committee discharged, and the sum of fifty dollars ordered paid to Mr. Robt. Dubouard for having said drainage. The warrant to be issued against the 5th ward internal improvement funds. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Manuel—That the Police Jury adjourn until 2 o'clock p. m.

EVENING SESSION.

The Police Jury met pursuant to adjournment. Present: Dr. Clopton, President; Messrs. Stelly, B. L. Lafleur, Adrastra Lafleur, Halphen, Muller, Haas, Bertrand, Guilloirey, Dailey, Savant, Manuel, Arceneau, Guilloirey, Arceneau, voting yes. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Deshotel—That a committee composed of Messrs. Henry Guilloirey, Gabriel Joubert and Aubin Lavergne, be appointed to estimate the probable cost of repairing bridge across Bayou Courtableau, and report at next regular meeting. Motion carried.

Motion by Mr. Dailey—That the committee this day appointed to confer with Mr. E. B. Dubinsson, Parish Attorney, for the purpose of drafting a suitable ordinance, or resolution providing for the setting aside of necessary funds to erect a steel bridge over Bayou Courtableau, be continued, and authorized to contract with Mr. J. W. Sylvester, civil engineer, to make suitable plans, specifications and estimate of cost of said steel bridge, and for the supervision of the building of the same, until next regular meeting. Motion carried.

CHARTER OF THE Progressive Land Co. LTD. State of Louisiana. Before me, the undersigned Notary Public, in and for the aforesaid State and Parish, on the 19th day of March, 1907, personally appeared, L. E. Littell, J. G. Lawler, V. H. Sibille, Raoul Le Bourgeois, Jno. W. Lewis and P. A. Rutledge, who declared and said unto me, Notary, that availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of Louisiana of the year 1880, they have contracted and agreed, and do by these presents contract and agree, and bind themselves and their heirs, assigns and successors to form and constitute a limited corporation for the objects and purposes, and under the stipulations and articles following, to-wit: That to say:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of the said corporation shall be the Progressive Land Co. Ltd. and shall have power and authority to have and enjoy succession for the full term and period herein; to contract, sue, and to be sued; to make a corporate seal, and to hold, lease, sell, purchase, convey, as well as to mortgage, pledge, and hypothecate, in and out of the State, all real and personal property both real and personal; to name and appoint such managers, directors, and officers, as the interest and conveniences of said association may require; to make and ratify all such contracts, covenants, and regulations for the conduct of its affairs as may be necessary and proper, and the same to do all such other acts and things as may be necessary to carry out the objects and purposes of this corporation.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation, shall be in the City of Opelousas, Louisiana, and the citation and all other legal process, shall be served on the President of the corporation, or in his absence or death, upon the Secretary, and all such shall be brought to the corporation name, under and by authority of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III. The purpose for which this corporation is established, and the nature and kind of business to be conducted, shall be to hold, buy, own, sell, mortgage, hypothecate, pledge and lease lands in and out of the State, and to raise thereon all such crops as may be grown and made in Louisiana; to buy, own and sell, in and out of the State, all kinds of personal and movable property that may be necessary to or facilitate the carrying on of the corporate business; to buy and operate saw mills, sugar mills, syrup or molasses mills, or other like mills, and to manufacture and produce, and to manufacture and produce of all kinds of sawed lumber or other products of sawed lumber, and to hold or hold under contract by the corporation, as well as to manufacture and convert into commercial or marketable form, the crops grown on lands owned, leased or held under contract by said corporation, and generally to buy, own, lease, sell and make all other contracts in relation to the carrying on of the corporate business, as may be incidental to or advantageous to the general business of this corporation.

The capital stock of said corporation shall be divided into five hundred shares of the par value of one hundred (\$100.00) each, and the same shall be subscribed and paid for by the following persons, to-wit: L. ARTICLE V. The following persons are declared to be the incorporators of the Progressive Land Co. Ltd., and they have subscribed and paid for the amount of capital stock for the commencement of business operations of this company as herein subscribed and paid for in full, in the aforesaid Secretary's Book, No. 13, page— of date March 26, 1907.

ARTICLE VI. I hereby certify that the above foregoing is a true and correct copy of the original filed in my office, and of record in my office in Miscellaneous Secretary Book, No. 13, page— of date March 26, 1907.

ARTICLE VII. Whenever this corporation is dissolved, either by limitation of Charter from other cause its affairs shall be liquidated by two commissioners to be appointed from among its stockholders at a meeting of the stockholders convened after notice mailed to said stockholders, at least fifteen days before said meeting, and published one time each week for three weeks in one of the weekly newspapers published in the City of Opelousas, La., and elected by two-thirds of the stockholders in the said meeting. Said Commissioners shall remain in office until the affairs of the said corporation shall have been fully liquidated, and in case of death of one of said commissioners, the other one commissioner shall be authorized to complete said liquidation.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder shall be held liable or responsible for the contracts or debts of this corporation, or for the payment of his unpaid stock, nor shall any more informality in organization, or any defect in this charter, have the effect of rendering the corporation null, or of exposing any stockholders to any liability.
